Who We Are

Identity

CHANGANACHERRY SOCIAL SERVICE SOCIETY (CHASS) is the official organ of the Archdiocese of Changanacherry for social concerns and development interventions addressing the weaker sections of society, irrespective of caste, creed, or religion. Besides the officialdom in the Archdiocesan setup, the Society has been granted NGO status under the Charitable provisions of the Government Act (Travancore-Cochin Literary, Scientific, and Charitable Societies Registration Act XII of 1955). Founded in the year 1966, the Society has always remained a pioneering organisation in social innovations and research based rural development services.

The Society has a democratic set up having its General Body constituted of village representatives, parish priests, subject experts, and specially nominated persons by the patron Archbishop. In this respect, the Society is built upon a substantial people's organisational base at the village level; the important among them are Village Development Councils (Local Social Service Units), Mahilasamajams, Credit Unions, Self-Help Groups and Farmers Clubs

The Society has a large operational area in the south and south central parts of Kerala, spread over 5 civil districts: Kottayam, Alappuzha, Pathanamthitta, Kollam and Thiruvananthapuram. The operational area is divided into 18 regions consisting of 168 local units for effective management and active involvement.

2021-22

CHASS is delighted to present the report of its accomplishments for the year 2021–22. The year 2021–22 was one of challenges and successes: the launch of two new programs, the extension of our existing projects and programs, and revitalising the local structures and systems in the aftermath of the COVID–19 pandemic. Changanacherry Social Service Society has successfully carried out its multifaceted programmes and projects in 2021–22 for the sustainable development of the poor and marginalized. The projects and programmes of CHASS are, by and large, directed towards "sustainable development," both in content as well as integration. It is envisaged that the people's rights are fulfilled so as to equitably meet their development and environmental needs spanning generations. The objectives of sustainable development are to provide for the economic well-being of the present and future generations and maintain a healthy environment and life support system. It promotes that process of development that (a) upgrades the quality of human resources, (b) reduces the disparities in lifestyle, (c) improves and maintains a healthy local environment, and (d) promotes the social order, which is participatory and community oriented.

2. CIVIL SOCIETY ORGANIZATIONS& HUMAN RESOURCE DEVELOPMENT

Civil society organisations (CSOs) are the backbone of any social work agency, as they operate at the grassroots. According to CHASS, the Civil Society organisations referred to are the Local Social Service Units of CHASS which represent different functional grassroots organisations of stakeholders, namely, Self Help Group, Mahilasamajams, Farmers Clubs Joint Liability Groups, and Micro Credit Unions. This year, about 65,000 marginalised rural

poor have been organizationally lined up, duly substantiated by awareness and specific functions geared towards self-reliant development.



2.a. Local Social Service Trusts

Village level Local Social Service Units of CHASS are the apex body of all the grassroots level people's organisations functioning under the banner of CHASS. The governing body of the CHASS local unit is duly constituted by the elected representatives of all the CSOs functioning under the umbrella. CHASS works through 168 local Trusts which are located in local parishes, duly monitored by the parish priest, and supported by the regional coordinator of CHASS. These units are the functional structure of CHASS at the grassroots. These local units are networked with 18 region- Forane level units functioning under the CHASS banner. Local units (trusts) support CHASS to identify and prioritise the problems or issues at the village level and to plan, implement, and evaluate the projects and programs. They also undertake local need based activities of their own. As part of evaluating streamlining and capacitating the local units, CHASS conducted unit visits and executive meetings in 70 units. Fr. Thomas Kulathumkal, Executive Director of CHASS together with Mr. Jobie Mathew, Project Officer, visited the units, interacted with the unit executives, evaluated the ongoing projects and programs, and worked out an action plan for future interventions.

2.b. Self Help Groups

A Self-Help Group (SHG) is a neighbourhood fraternity of like-minded people with common goals who come together to participate in development activities such as mutual learning and cooperation, thrift and saving, credit, and income generation, ensuring economic independence. It is a grassroots people's organisation mainly intended to mobilise human resources for community development. The SHG phenomenon undoubtedly fosters group consciousness, a sense of belonging, self-esteem, a sense of public participation, an expanded horizon of social involvements, adequate self-confidence, and so on.



SHG and Community Banking

All the SHGs have fostered a culture of savings among the members and systematic application of the savings mobilised for the economic well being of the members. CHASS has always presented a good model for enforcing savings and credit discipline among its SHG members. All the SHGs have a savings bank account at the nearest area bank branch, in which all cash balances are deposited after meeting day-to-day business needs. In addition to

this, all the SHGs are linked to the village-level Micro Credit Unions functioning under the banner of CHASS.

2.c. Mahilasamajams

In all the villages (parishes), the women's SHGs are coordinated under a federated body named Mahilasamajam. At present, there are 93 Mahila Samajams actively functioning under the banner of CHASS. These Mahilasamajams are federated under a central network body named AWARD. Monthly meetings, leadership development programs, skill training, responding to social issues, coordinating the functions of women SHGs in the respective locality, and income generation programmes are the major activities of Mahila Samajams.

2.d.Farmers Clubs

CHASS is also promoting farmers' clubs as part of promoting organic farming. There are 56 farmers clubs actively engaged in organic farming practises in the operational area of CHASS. These groups focus on and promote organic farming, and they also organise village markets where people can buy chemical free vegetables and other products at lower prices.



2.eJoint Liability Groups (JLGs)

CHASS has taken initiatives to form Joint Liability Groups as an effective tool to augment the flow of credit to farmers, especially small, marginal tenant farmers, and oral lessees taking up farm activities. JLGs are groups formed from existing SHGs of five to ten members. In the reporting year, 180 JLGs have been renewed and 15 JLGs have been newly formed.



3. PEOPLE'S AWARENESS AND DEVELOPMENT TRAINING

As already mentioned, the society is functioning through village microdevelopment organizations. More than an operational link, these grassroots organisations are visualised to delve deeply into the community development work of the concerned village in a self propelled and duly synthesised manner. It is placed on record here that the formation and activation of these village organisations entailed a lot of animation work and training of various types and grades.

Different social work colleges, agriculture universities, and arts and sciences colleges in and outside of Kerala state send their students to CHASS for NGO experience, social work practices, and field exposure as part of their academic curricula. Fr. Thomas Kulathumkal, Director CHASS, Fr. Ancilo Elenjiparampil, Assistant Director CHASS, and Mr. Jobie Mathew, Project Officer CHASS, led the orientation classes, guided them through the effective conduct of their internship in the organization, and gave them certificates. **158** students from the following listed colleges visited CHASS during this period.

4. CHASS MICRO-CREDIT PROGRAM

CHASS has successfully promoted and popularised a community banking system through a well-oiled Microcredit Credit Program networked by 135 village Credit Unions making the rural economy vibrant. This also provides a significant mass base for the society in all of its participatory community development processes.


The majority of the population in this segment of the poorest, roughly 80%, are constantly in need of small loans for sustaining their existing employment, for the generation of further employment, and also for meeting varied personal and social needs. The poorest among the poor need loans of very small amounts, but their requirement is quick delivery of loans at their doorsteps. Traditionally, private money lenders have played this role, but their intentions have been to exploit the poor instead of helping them, and this has rather worsened the plight of the poor. Over a period of time, the significance of provisions of credit as an instrument of socioeconomic change and developments has been realized, and many national organizations, including banks, have come up with programmes to provide soft loans to the poor in order to free them from the clutches of private money lenders.

CHASS credit union covers 135 villages of Changanacherry Social Service Society, and more than 41182 families and 884 SHGs are direct members of this grassroots network.

5. AGRICULTURE & ANIMAL HUSBUNDERY

The five decades that passed can be rightly termed the "crisis period" in agriculture in Kerala, which happens to be the mainstay of the village economy. As an agency primarily concerned with rural life, it was imperative on the part of CHASS to meaningfully express its solidarity and support to remedy the crisis with appropriate interventions directed towards *sustainable agriculture*. In this respect, the Society resorted to a multi-pronged intervention strategy, namely,

- Farmers Dynamic Organizations and Networking
- □ Farmers Producers companies
- □ Whole Farm Approach
- Organic Farming Practices
- Value added Product Processing and Storage
- Organized Marketing

Farmers' Clubs

Farmers' Clubs (FCs) are grass-roots, informal forums of farmers. Such clubsare organised by rural branches of banks with the support and financial assistance of NABARD for the mutual benefit of the banks concerned and the village farmingcommunity/rural people. CHASS is also promoting farmers' clubs as part of promoting agriculture, with special reference to organic farming. There are 56 farmers clubs actively engaged in farming practises in the operational area of CHASS. These groups focus on and promote organic farming, and they also organise village markets where people can buy chemical pesticide-free vegetables and other products at normal prices. We conduct various training programmes and awareness classes in this area.



Farmers Producers Companies

CHASS organised three consultation meetings with regard to the formation of Farmer Producer Companies in Kottyam and Alappuzha districts. On February 9, Mr. Regi Zacharia DDM Nabard Kottayam presided over the first meeting at the CHASS conference hall. The second and third meetings were held on February 12 and 15, 2022, respectively. In the Kottayam District, two farmer producer companies were formed, one under the Small Farmers Agri-Business Consortium (SFAC) and the other under NABARD.

Organic farming Practices

Organic farming, agricultural system that uses ecologically based pest controls and biological fertilisers derived largely from animal and plant wastes and nitrogen-fixing cover crops. Modern organic farming was developed as a response to the environmental harm caused by the use of chemical pesticides and synthetic fertilisers in conventional agriculture, and it has numerous ecological benefits. The promotion of food and health security is undertaken through the networking of community based organisations like self help groups, farmer's groups, JLGs, etc. Local social service units in the village are kicking off the

campaign with organic farming, using value-added bio manures and bio pesticides instead of chemical fertilisers and pesticides. Different environmentally friendly practises also ensure water and soil conservation. Waste land cultivation and the substitution of food crops against cash crops are also initiated under the project. All the units of CHASS are participating in this endeavour.

Framers get together South Zone

CHASS, in collaboration with the JPD Commission, organised a Farmers' Get-Together at Aryankavu and Amboori on August 9, 2022, as part of the protest against the declaration of the Aryankav, Amboori, and Mayam areas, which are the major settled areas under Changanassery Archdiocese in southern Kerala, as an eco-sensitive buffer zone in the Western Ghats by the Central Ministry for the Ministry of Forests and Environment. In the forenoon, farmers from Aryankav and nearby villages assembled in St. Mary's Church Hall, which was presided over by Rev. Fr. Thomas Puthenpueackal. The keynote address was given by Fr. Thomas Kulathumkal, Secretary of CHASS, and the introductory remarks were given by Fr. Jacob Mavunkal, Executive Director of KSSF. Mr. Jobie Mathew, Project Officer, CHASS, led the group discussions. The Aryankav Panchayath president, Ms. Suja Thomas, and ward member, Ms. Jeseentha Roy, felicitated on the occasion. This was followed by another meeting in the afternoon at Amboori. Rev. Fr. Kurian Thekedam presided over the meeting. Rev. Fr. Mathew Moonnattinmukham presented a consolidated report on the involvement of CHASS and the Archdiocese of Changnacherry in the South Zone for the welfare of farming communities. Mr. Thomas Manglasserry, Vice president of Amboorin Panchayath, inaugurated the meeting .Ms. Laly John and Ms. Bindhu Bino, members of the Amboorin panchayath, felicitated on the occasion.

other organizations. It is also promoted at Sunday markets and through Nattuchanda for marketing the products at the grassroots level under the leadership of CHASS local units.



Onam Mela

CHASS organised a four-day Onam Mela on August 17–20, 2021, at its premises in collaboration with the Kerala State Agriculture Development and Farmers Welfare Department and Krishi Bhavan Changnacherry. A variety of locally produced agriculture products were exhibited and marketed in the mela. Mrs. Sandhya Manoj, municipal chairperson, inaugurated the mela. Fr. Joseph Vaniapurackal presided over the function. Mrs. Anina Susan Scareia, Deputy Director of the Agiculture Office, Madappally gave the keynote address. Fr. Samrudha Agriculture Nursery Kurumbanadom

Samrudha Agriculture Nursery Kurumbanadom is a demonstration farm and a plant nursery in support of the agriculture programmes being promoted CHASS. Samrudha has a compound measuring three hectors, situated 12 km from CHASS headquarters. The main objective of Samrudha is to promote sustainable organic farming and protect the interests of farmers. Samrudha is famous for its demonstration plots for coconut, rubber, plantains, bananas, vegetables, roots and tubers, pepper, ginger, etc. During the reporting period, Samrudha extended its service to more than 7,250 farmers by way of awareness creation, model farm creation, and supply of seeds, seedlings, grow bags, etc.

6. NATURAL RESOURCE MANAGEMENT (NRM)

CHASS's focus on sustainable development of watersheds and livelihoods has prevailed on its best efforts to improve natural resource bases. In this regard, the natural resource management programme being widely promoted by the government and voluntary organisations with science and technology inputs is completely consistent with the societal thrust.

World Environment Day – 2021:

Unit Level Programs: CHASS local units observed World Environment Day 2021 with a SHG get-together, cleaning the sheds, and tree planting.

Drawing Competetion: Changanacherry Social Service Society organised a drawing competition for UP and high school students as part of World Environment Day on June 5, 2021, at Changanacherry in collaboration with CHASS local units and schools. The subject was cancer and environmental degradation.

Tree Saplings Distribution: CHASS in collaboration with Social forestry department distributed Tree saplings to 5000 families.

Nurture Project: CHASS, in collaboration with the Kerala Social Service Forum, started a new eco-friendly tree planting programme named the Nurture Project. Under this scheme, a Root Zone Fertigation (RZF) planting system is adopted for concentrated effect. The official inauguration of the project was done by Fr. Thomas Kulathumkal, Director of CHASS, on September 16, 2021, at Samrudha Agriculture Center Kurumbanadom. Mr. Jobie Mathew, the project officer, Mr. Carmel Jobie Mathew, Mr. Littymon and Mr. Joseph Devasia were present in the program.



Green Protocol

CHASS, in collaboration with the Kerala Social Service Forum, promoted the Green Protocol in CHASS premises and its various institutions. 7. RURAL COMMUNITY HEALTH CARE

Health is considered to be an important dimension of human development. Good health is not only a prerequisite for the well being of mankind but also augments labour productivity and stimulates economic growth. The following are the different health-related services rendered by CHASS during the years 2021–2022.

7.A. ASHAKIRANAM CANCER CARE PROGRAM

Ashakiranam Cancer Care Program Changanacherry is a joint venture of CHASS and Caritas India for the prevention and mitigation of cancer and other lifestyle diseases.

Awarenes Training for Care takers: On November 10 and 11, 2021, CHASS held two days of intensive cancer and pre-hospital medicine training for caregivers working in palliative care units.Fr. Thomas Kulathumkal inagaurated the program. Mr. Jobie Mathew, project officer for CHASS, gave the opening remarks.Ms. Siby Paulose, State Coordinator Ashakiranam, Caritas India, Mrs. Bindhu Thomas, and Mrs. Sheeba Santhosh were the resource persons.



Breast Cancer Awareness: CHASS Ashakiranam Cancer Care wing observed Pink Day on October 22nd as part of its campaign against breast cancer.

DLO Training: CHASS Ashakiranam Cancer Care Program Coordinator, participated in the DLO training conducted by Caritas India at regular intervals

Promotion of Organic Kitchen Gardening: CHASS Ashakiranam Wing joined the CHASS agriculture development programme and helped 1470 families start organic kitchen gardening.Regular accompaniment and support from the CHASS local unit helped them produce and consume homemade toxic free vegetables, roots, tubers, and fruits.

Orientation for Agriculture University Students: A one-day orientation programme was arranged for the students from Agriculture University Kazragode on December 15, 2021. Mr. Jobie Mathew, Project Officer CHASS, gave an introductory speech. Mrs. Bindhu Thomas and Mrs. Sheeba Santosh led the classes.



Webinar: On February 3, presented a webinar on cancer preventive and precautionary measures.Fr. Thomas Kulathumkal, Director, gave an introductory speech. Dr. Varghese Antony, clinical oncologist at St. Thomas Hospital, Chethipuzha, led the class on preventive and precautionary measures for cancer, and Dr. P.C. Shahul Ameen took the class on cancer and drug addiction. On the occasion, Fr. Ansilo Mathew and Mr. Jobie Mathew, Project Officer CHASS, spoke.150 selected patients or volunteers participated along with the CHASS team.

Cancer awareness for Collage students: Ashakiranam Cacer Care Wing organised an awareness programme for the collage students on March 10, 2022, at St. Berchman's College Indoor Stadium. Dr. Abhirami Prakash, St. Thomas Hospital Chethipuzha inaugurated the program, which was presided over by Fr. George Panackezham, assistant director of CHASS. Dr. P.C. Shahul Ameen took a class on early detection of cancer and treatments. Fr. George Manthuruthil, Assistant Director CHASS, Mr. T.M. Mathew, and Mrs. Sheeba Santhosh spoke on the occasion.



Live Free Cotton Sanitary Pad: The "Live Free" reusable cotton sanitary pad developed by the Ashakiranam desk of CHASS is well accepted by Kerala women, particularly the women of Central Travancore. It is soft, hygienic, reusable, non-allergic, natural, and low-cost. CHASS uses high-quality cotton cloth with non-leaking technology for safety, and the best part is that it is reusable. An expert team of ten women is fully engaged in the production of the Live Free Cotton Sanitary Padat the COPTAC Tailoring cum Training Center of CHASS. The aim behind this venture is CHASS's great concern for effective waste management and to promote healthy practises among women, particularly teenagers, and thus prevent the possibility of chronic diseases like cervical cancer.



7.B. Grahalakshmi Home Nursing Service:

It may be of some relevance to mention here the home nursing service conducted by the Society. Families where bed-ridden patients are in dire need of professional nursing care are provided for under specific terms and conditions agreed upon. Ten trained home nurses are available for service on a rotating basis. This year, 55 people benefited from the services of our home nurses.

Pallilative Care and Home Nursing Training:

In collaboration with NABARD, CHASS organised a two-month Palliative Care and Home Nursing training programme for 30 women in Changnacherry.Mar Thomas Tharyail, Auxilliary Bishop of Changnacherry, inaugurated the training programme on November 2, 2021. The meeting was presided over by V. Rev. Fr. Joseph Vaniapurackal, President of CHASS.Mr. Reji Zacharia, DDM NABARD Kottayam, delivered the keynote address, and the introductory speech was done by Fr. Thomas Kulathumkal, Secretary CHASS..





7.C. One House One Toliet Project

One house, one toilet is a special project sponsored by SAFP India. This project identifies and supports the construction of toilets for 175 deserving families who do not have proper toilet facilities. SAFP disbursed the 1st instalment of Rs. 35,50,000 to 142 families from Ayarkunnam, Nedumkunnam, Manimala, Kulathur, Vellavor, Champakulam, Pulincunnoo, Edathua, Mallappally, and Kooroppad villages. Tioelt Construction was completed by 15 families out of 175 total.



7.D. JalJeevan Mission Project

Jal Jeevan Mission is a massive and intensive drinking water supply project initiated by the central government. Under this project, it is envisioned to provide safe and adequate drinking water through individual household tap connections by 2024 to all households in rural India. The programme also targeted implementing source sustainability measures as mandatory elements, such as recharge and reuse through grey water management, water conservation, rainwater harvesting. The Jal Jeevan Mission is based on a community approach to water and includes extensive information, education, and communication as a key components of the mission. The Central Government is implementing this project in collaboration with State Governments, Gramapanchayath, Water Autority and Implementation Supporting Agencies (ISA). CHASS is one of the Implementation Supporting Agencies in Kerala. CHASS is entrusted with Vazhappally and madappally GPs in Kottayam District and Nedumudy & Champakulam GPs in Alappuzha district.

Jaljeevan State level Launching: Fr. Ansilo Mathew, Asst. Director, and Mr. Baiju Xavier, Project Coordinator for JJM, CHASS, participated in the Jaljeevan state level launch programme on November 1, 2021, at Trivandrum, conducted by the Kerala Government.

Water Day State level Inaguration: Fr. Thomas Kulathumkal, Director of CHASS, took part in the Kerala government's Water Day State Level Inauguration Program and the Jaladinavilambara Rally by carrying water from the River Manimala.

Preliminary Orientation Champakulam: In Champakulam and Nedumudy Gramapanchayaths, CHASS organised a preliminary ointment programme for social workers, volunteers, and Panchayath members on JalJeevan. Champakulam GP level programme was arranged on February 25, 2022, at St. John's Parish Hall, Thekekara. The programme was inaugurated by Smt. Jalagakumari President Champakulam GP and presided over by Fr. Ansilo Mathew, Asst. Director of CHASS. Smt. Indhu P. Nad, Engineer, KWA, explained the project. Social work practice in De-addiction -22^{nd} June 2021

MSW students from various social work colleges in Kerala shared their experiences in order to gather the ground reality of addicts and the precautions to be taken by the de-addiction sector. Sri. Roshi Augustine, the honourable Minister for Irrigation and Water Resources, Kerala, inaugurated the meeting. The students presented their findings and suggestions in a PowerPoint presentation. There were sixteen groups, with a total of five students in each group. Ten minutes were allotted to each group for their presentation. The session was moderated by Mr. T. M. Mathew, who has 35 years of experience in the field of de-addiction. All of the pupils who took part in the programme received participation certificates, and the best presentation was awarded a gift. Fr. Giju Varghese, coordinator of SLCA Kerala, extended the vote of thanks. The session was hosted by Mr. Carmel Jobie Mathew, the field officer with SLCA Kerala.

Speech Competition for the children of the beneficiaries of IRCAs in Kerala.

For the children of IRCA beneficiaries in Kerala, a speech contest was held in the afternoon. The subject was "My involvement in a drug-free campaign in schools and playgrounds." The speech competition's first round was conducted right there in the IRCA centres. For the final round, the top candidate was forwarded to SLCA Kerala. Altogether, forty-two children took part in the competition. A panel of three members with experience in this field judged the speeches and assigned grades appropriately. All of the pupils who took part in the final round received participation certificates, and the best speeches were awarded with cash prizes. The session was hosted by Mr. Carmel Jobie Mathew, the field officer with SLCA Kerala.

Experience sharing of Retrieved Addicts – preparation of a Collache of the 3 days activity before and after treatment. 23rd June 2021

On June 23rd, the retrieved addicts shared their experiences before and after the de-addiction treatment. In the Zoom meeting on June 23, they were asked to prepare a summary of their experience and explain their feelings or experiences based on the summary. Fr. Giju Varghese, coordinator of SLCA Kerala, gave the message of the day and presented the response of the SLCA evaluation team.

Poster Competition for IRCA Centres.

On the afternoon of June 23, a poster competition was organised for the IRCA centres in Kerala. The subject of the poster preparation was "Share the Facts on Drugs, Save Lives." 25 IRCAs participated in this program.

Quiz Competition for Youth (18-25 years)- 24th June 2021

On June 24th afternoon, a quiz competition for youth (18-25) was held using the Google Forms and Zoom platforms.Sri. Veerendra Mishra, Director of NISD, inaugurated the quiz competition. Adv. Job Michael MLA (Changanacherry Constituency) was present to celebrate the occasion.The subject was "Drugs and Youth." Altogether, 218 youth participated in the program.

Drawing Competition for children (10-15 years)

In the afternoon, a drawing competition for children (10–15) was arranged. The subject for the competition was "An Addict I Have Seen." 175 children took part in the drawing competition and submitted their work to SLCA Kerala via the Zoom and Google platforms.

Quiz Competition for IRCA Staffs. – 25th Jine 2021

A quiz competition was organised for the IRCA staff members of Kerala State. The subject was "Drugs and International Day for Drug Abuse, including Illicit Trafficking." Sri. Kodikunnil Suresh M.P. (Mavelikara Constituency) inaugurated the programme at 10.00am. Ms. Jalaja (Jt. Director - Social Justice Department, Govt. of Kerala) delivered the message on Anti-Narcotic Day. 38 staff from 21 IRCA participated in the program.

SLCA Kerala Partners Meet.

A Zoom meeting was used to organise the SLCA Kerala partners' meeting on June 25th. Mrs. Sheeba George (Director, Social Justice Department, Govt. of Kerala) was the chief guest. All the partners attended the programme and shared their opinions, experiences, and difficulties, as well as the way forward.

Phone in Program.

SLCA Kerala, in collaboration with Radio Media Village 90.8, a leading community radio station in central Travancore, arranged a phone in programme giving publicity to Anti-NNarcotic Day. The programme was on the 25th from 9 to 10 p.m. and the 26th from 10 - 11 a.m. This was a good experience for the participants and listeners.


International Day against Drug Abuse and Illicit Trafficking- 26th June 2021 Competitions – Result Announcement.

Giju Varghese, Coordinator for SLCA , TM Mathew, and Carmel Jobie Mathew , SLCA staff, led the sessions with a PowerPoint presentation.







A.3. Capacity Building Program for IRCA Counselors

SLCA-Kerala hosted a five-day intensive capacity-building training for IRCA counsellors in Kerala on January 17–21, 2022, at the SLCA hall in Changanacherry. SLCA Coordinator

Giju Varhhese inaugurated the training program. Dr. P.C. Shakul Ameen, Prof. N.M. Sebastian, Fr. Ancilo Mathew, Mr. T.M. Mathew, and Mr. Carmel Jobie Mathew were the resource persons.





A.4. Capacity Building Program for Teachers

A two-day capacity-building programme on drug abuse prevention was held for school teachers on January 19 and 20, 2022. SLCA Coordinator Giju Varhhese inaugurated the training program. Prof. N.M. Sebastian taught a class on children and drug abuse, and Mr. Joseph Antony handled the subject of mental health and children. Fr. Ancili Mathew, Mr. T.M. Mathew, and Mr. Carmel Jobie Mathew led the other sessions and panel discussions.

A.4. Orientation Program for Nurses and ward Boys

A three-day orientation programme on how to deal with drug addicts was organised in two batches for nurses and ward boys at IRCAS in Kerala. The first batch was held on February 23rd and 25th, 2022. SLCA Coordinator Giju Varhhese inaugurated the training program. Dr. P.C. Shakul Ameen, Prof. N.M. Sebastian, Mr. Martin Joseph, Mr. Sihab P.K., and Mr. TM. Mathew were the resource persons. Mr. Carmel Jobie Mathew coordinated the training program.

The second batch's orientation took place on February 14-16, 2022. SLCA Coordinator Giju Varhhese inaugurated the training program. Dr. P.C. Shakul Ameen, Prof. N.M. Sebastian,

Mr. Martin Joseph, and Fr. Ancilo Mathew Mr. Sihab P.K. and Mr. TM. Mathew were the resource persons. Mr. Carmel Jobie Mathew coordinated the training program.

A.5. Community Awareness Program

One day community-level awareness programmes were conducted at 15 locations in Changanacherry, Thuruthy, Kurumbanadom, Kottayam, Nedumkunnam, Kudamaloor, Manimala, Alappuzha, Champakulam, and Edathua villages in order to make people aware of the threatening effects of drug abuse and the precautions against the fast growing tendency of female addicts in Kerala. SLCA Coordinator Giju Varhhese inaugurated the training program. Prof. N.M. Sebastian, Mr. TM. Mathew, Mr. Carmel Jobie Mathew, Mr. Liju Thomas, Mr. Litymon MS, Mr. Sam Alex, and Mr. Goji George were the resource persons.







A.6. Awareness Program for College Students

SLCA-Kerala organised one-day awareness programmes on drug abuse among college students and its consequences from March 11^{th} to 22^{nd} , 2022, at 10 colleges in Kottayam, Alappuzha, and Kollam districts. Giju Varghese, Coordinator for SLCA , TM Mathew, and Carmel Jobie Mathew , SLCA staff, Annie Raichal, Litymon MS, Liju Thomas, and Goji George led the sessions with a Power Point presentation.





A.7. Street Plays

Street plays describing the importance of fighting against the spread of drug abuse were conducted at different locations in collaboration with MSW students of S.B. College, Assumption College, and St. Gregory's College Parumala, under the guidance of Mr. Carmel Jobie Mathew , SLCA staff.

A.8. Orientation for Nursing Students

A two-day orientation programme on how to handle and respond to drug addicts was conducted at St. Rita's Hospital Nalukody for the Nursing students. Giju Varghese, Coordinator for SLCA, inaugurated the program. TM Mathew, Sr. Selma SRA, and Carmel Jobie Mathew, SLCA staff, along with Litymon and Martin Martin from IRCA Punnapra led the sessions and group discussions.



B. INTEGRATED REHABILITATION CENTRES (IRCAs)

ACCEPT Counseling Center for Alcoholics and Drug Addicts was established at Punnapra in Alappuzha District by the Changanacherry Social Service Society (CHASS) as a pioneer in the social service sector with an unblemished record. This centre was then shifted to Kaithavana in Alappuzha District in 1993 and continued as a counselling and drug awareness centre there until March 31, 2002. On April 1, 2001, the ACCEPT Center was shifted to Nooranadu, Alappuzha District, since Nooranadu has the highest rate of suicide due to alcohol and drug abuse. ACCEPT Counselling Centre was renamed the ACCEPT Deaddiction Centre, Nooranadu, on August 1, 2001, thanks to a grant-in-aid for de-addiction treatment from the Ministry of Social Justice and Empowerment's INTEGRATED REHABILITATION CENTRES (IRCAs). This centre was again shifted from Nooranadu to a nearby village, Kattanam, on April 1, 2003, due to scarcity of water, and thereafter became known as the ACCEPT De-addiction Center Kattanam. This centre is now getting the backing of a multi specialty general hospital since it is situated on the campus of the 300-bed St. Thomas Mission Hospital, Vettikkodu P.O., Kattanam. In 1997, CHASS started the ACCEPT De-addiction Center Punnapra at Alappuzha, and it is continuing there with the grant in aid for de-addiction treatment from the Ministry of Social Justice and Empowerment, Government of India. Following are the different activities of ACCEPT centres for the years 2021-2022.

d. Publications of the year

e. Celebrations and observances

f.Support persons meet

A supportive person's meeting is a gathering of friends and relatives of people who are receiving treatment for alcohol dependency syndrome at ACCEPT IRCA. This particular programme is conducted every first Sunday at ACCEPT IRCA, Punnapra, and every last Sunday at ACCEPT IRCA, Kattanam. There are lectures, group discussions, and counselling sessions with family members. The main objectives of the program are the following

- ➤ To mobilise psychosocial support for patients among family members and friends, particularly in their sober lives
- ➤ To clarify the myths, misconceptions, and facts about addiction treatment, sober life, and follow-up.
- > To help the friends and relatives identify their role in a sober life

9. COMMUNITY BASED REHABILITATION OF DIFFERENTLY ABLED

Community-Based Rehabilitation (CBR) has been advocated internationally for a decade as the core strategy for improving the quality of life of persons who should be active partners in the planning and implementation of all measures affecting their civil, political, economic, social, and cultural rights, but the right to a civilised life is frequently denied to the differently abled, so there is an absolute, urgent need for CBR. The vision is to integrate the disabled into the main stream of society through community participation and involvement. And the mission is to enhance the quality of life of disabled individuals and create social awareness about their problems. For many years, the CHASS has shown its concern for the differently abled in various ways, most notably through sponsorship and the operation of special institutions for their care. However, the approach has undergone a desirable change with the introduction of community-based rehabilitation in 1999.

As a means of reaching the families and the community at large with the message, CHASS has put into service seven animators who conduct house visits at regular intervals, give training to the family members on the scientific aspects of treating the disabled dependents as well as the institutional services available, initiate home based training of the differently abled, etc. Every village has self-help groups for the disabled, which are overseen by guardians. Besides, local committees have also been formed as support groups. Under the CBR program, CHASS covers 138 panchayats, 20 blocks, and 3 municipalities in five civil districts of Kerala. Our major intervention components are:

- o Disability survey & detection of DA
- Obtaining medical& disability certificate
- o Linking with Government welfare provisions
- o Surgical corrections and therapeutic interventions
- Supply of instrumental aids & appliances
- o Building community & family responsibility
- o Availability of professional services of CBR workers at source
- Vocational training for DA
- o Job placement and self employment
- Organizing and activating Self Help Groups

Currently, 5911 disabled people from various categories have benefited from CHASS's community-based rehabilitation programme over the last 23 years. By way of stating the tangible results that have been achieved by the program, 551 youth were imparted job oriented vocational training and skills; 582 were placed in jobs; another 1140 were provided with self-employment schemes; 1538 were given aids & appliances; 113 were assisted with housing; and 2565 were enrolled in permanent disability pension schemes.

Rehaswiss Program

Rehaswiss, Switzerland, an international funding agency having headquarters in Switzerland and working exclusively for the sustainable development of differently abled people, helped CHASS provide IGPs to 41 people during the 2021–22 period, along with a skill training and awareness programme for the siblings of the differently abled.



Asha Talent Promotion

It is a dream project of REHASWiSS to upgrade the talents of the differently able women by initiating their creativity and work culture for better result and to improve their own income through innovative projects. The main objective of the project is to promote the creativity and talent of the differently able by providing innovative impulses and inspiration.

Institution Based Rehabilitation

ASSISSI VYDYALAYAM POONTHPOE

A special school, - *AssissiVidyalaya* - for mentally retarded children was established in 1992 in the densely populated coastal town of Alappuzha—Ponthope. During the year, there were 74 children on the rolls suffering from various forms of retardation. The school is owned and managed by the Changanacherry Social Service Society. The support and guidance of the

Directorate of Public Instruction (DPI) of the Government of Kerala help run this home in an effective way. DPI sanctioned and disbursed Rs. 9 during the academic year 2021–22.

The universally accepted syllabus conceived and developed by the National Institute for the Mentally Handicapped (NIMH) is followed as the curriculum. The children, having been scientifically and medically assessed in terms of their IQ, age, growth, physical abilities, etc., are divided into different groups: case group, pre-primary, primary, secondary, pre-vocational, and vocational. Till noon, the classes are on academics, while the full afternoon is devoted to behavioural practises and the potential development inherent in the children. Considerable time is spent on sports, crafts, arts, etc.. Parental education, regular health checkups, cumulative progress assessments, and medical and surgical corrections are also included in the program, with the assistance of experts on occasion.

10.FAMILY DEVELOPMENT

Least-income families and families with no earning member face significant challenges as they strive to advance in life. These families are leading an excluded life from the mainstream of society, and their self-esteem is very low. Save A Family Plan is a pioneering and leading international organisation dedicated to the upliftment of the poor and marginalised through a humanitarian approach. CHASS has been working with Save A Family Plan for 54 years to help poor and marginalised families in the Archdiocese of Chandigarh's operational area.

SAFP Family Development Program

Under Family Development, the regular sponsorship programme supported by Save A Family Plan CHASS could extend support to 319 of the most needy families from three regions during the reporting year. The support is used for improving their socio-economic

conditions through house visits, awareness creation, infrastructure development, education assistance to their children, medical treatment, livelihood development promotion, etc. The monthly sponsorship support was found to be very beneficial to poor families in providing them with the initial capital they needed to start micro-enterprises of their choice and earn a regular income from them.

12. LIVELIHOOD INITIATIVES

12.a. Employment and Income Generation

Responding to the abject poverty and undernutrition of the target population, the society has, since its inception, supported employment and income generation endeavors. Even though a considerable amount has been doled out for the purpose, apprehensions remain as to whether the assistance really served its purpose in any sustainable measure. However, of late, the society has been trying to implement such schemes within an organised framework and systematic order.

12.b. Co operative Tailoring Centre (COPTAC)

This institution holds the distinction of being the oldest undertaking of CHASS, having been established in the year 1975. Located in the immediate vicinity of CHASS's administrative office, the centre performs dual functions, viz., trains girls in tailoring and embroidery under the KGTE scheme and undertakes garment making. Every year, 50 girls complete training and receive certificates. The production wing employs 35 women. The production unit has a tie up with the Khadi programme such that the cloth produced under it is tailored into readymade garments at **COPTAC**. A special feature of the tailoring job carried out here is that vestments and cassock are done on a large scale, earning a reputation all over the country.

12.c. Collaboration with KSBCDC

CHASS has networked with several financial institutions to incorporate microfinance facilities into SHGs to strengthen their livelihood initiatives. The goal of this network is to provide low-interest loans in order to increase their profit. Kerala State Backward Community Development Corporation (KSBCDC) is one of the major institutions that have joined hands with CHASS to provide support to the needy. With the assistance of KSBCDC, CHASS has provided a loan of Rs. 1.5 crores for the establishment of IGPs in 50 groups.

12.d. Sanchari Skill Training:

CHASS designed a three-month special skill-training programme for women SHG members at their local community college. During the three month period, training will be provided in cutting & tailoring, hand embroidery, doormat making, ornament making, door curtain making, flower making, umbrella making, washing powder making, toilet soap making, liquid soap making, liquid blue making, lotion making, etc. This year, fifteen batches successfully completed the training, and a total of 580 people benefited from it.





12.e. EDP Training & SwasrayaMarket:

During this year we conducted 37 programmes on different trades and over 2891 members benefited from the programme.CHASS is running a swasraya market in order to ensure regular supply of raw materials to the EDP units to prepare, soap, soap powder, Liquid soap, Lotion etc. The demand comes from the members of SHGs and other CBOs of CHASS. The objective of the activity is to direct the people towards a self reliant growth

12. f. Institutionalized and Targeted "Earn While Learn" KVIC Program

Started in the year 1977, CHASS has been running institutions for training, production, and rural employment in collaboration with the government under the provisions of the Khadi & Village Industries Commission by catering to 150 stipendiary trainees at a time and an equal number of artisan and regular employees.

Training sector

The full-fledged training centre at Mallappally, which started under the programme in the year 1986, attained a higher status as **Khadi Gramodyog Vidyalaya**, with allotments for regular training courses.
