




1. CHASS AT GRASS-ROOT

CHASS has been instrumental in promoting and activating village-level people's organizations with the aim of organizing, orienting, and empowering rural communities for self-reliance in the development process. As part of this initiative, CHASS has supported the formation of various groups, including:

- Self-Help Groups (SHGs) of both men and women who come together to support each other in economic and social activities.
- Farmers Interest Groups (FIGs) which focus on agricultural activities with the aim to enhance

- the productivity and sustainability of farming practices.
- Joint Liability Groups (JLGs) which provide mutual support for accessing credit and sharing liability among members.
- Micro Credit Unions which provide access to small loans and financial services for their members, promoting financial inclusion.
- CHASS Local Unit which serves as localized bodies for implementing and monitoring various developmental activities at the village level.

Through these groups, CHASS aims to build the capacity of rural individuals and communities, to foster self-reliance and sustainable development.



CHASS LOCAL UNITS

Village-level Local Social Service Units of CHASS serve as the apex body for all grass root people's organizations and form the functional structure of CHASS at the grass-root level. CHASS operates through 154 local trusts, which are duly monitored by the parish priest and regional co-ordinators of CHASS.



CHASS MICRO- CREDIT UNITS

CHASS has successfully promoted and popularized a rural community banking system through a well-organized microcredit programme networked across 135 villages, thereby stimulating the rural economy. This initiative also provides a significant mass base for society in all of its participatory community development processes.



JOINT LIABILITY GROUPS (JLGs)

Joint Liability Groups (JLGs) are formed by selecting three to five members from Self-Help Groups (SHGs). They serve as an effective tool to increase the flow of credit to farmers, particularly small and marginal tenant farmers, as well as oral lessees involved in farming activities. Currently, there are 145 JLGs functioning under CHASS, with 25 of them being newly formed.

FARMERS PRODUCERS COMPANY

Two Farmers Producers Companies are functioning under the banner of CHASS, consisting of 45 Farmer's Interest Groups supported by NABARD & SFAC. These companies assist their members with farming, stocking, and marketing their products, including value-added products.



FARMER'S INTEREST GROUPS (FIGs)

CHASS promoted Farmer's Interest Groups (FIGs) in its operational area, with an average membership of 10-20 members who serve as the primary members of the farmer producer companies. Altogether, 45 FIGs started functioning during the reporting year.



FARMERS' CLUBS

CHASS is promoting farmers' clubs to encourage organic farming. There are 71 farmers' clubs actively engaged in organic farming practices within the operational area of CHASS. These groups focus on promoting organic farming and also organize village markets where people can buy chemical-free vegetables and other products at lower prices.



2. PLANNING AND GOVERNANCE

CHASS places significant importance on regular planning, assessment, and governance to ensure its efficient operation. By prioritizing strategic and operational planning, CHASS aligns its actions with its mission and goals. Regular assessments allow the organization to monitor performance, manage risks, and identify areas for improvement. Strong governance practices ensure accountability, transparency, and compliance with regulations, enabling CHASS to operate effectively and maintain its integrity.

Planning and governance at CHASS are realized through several key processes: General Body and Governing Board meetings, annual planning by the central team, the CHASS family gathering, regional Planning, Monitoring and Evaluation (PME) sessions, and quarterly review meetings. These activities ensure a structured approach to decision-making, programme evaluation, and future planning.



GOVERNING BOARD AND GENERAL BODY MEETING

The Governing Board meetings of CHASS were convened on 23 September 2023, 25 November 2023, and 12 January 2024, to evaluate the activities carried out so far and to develop an action plan for the upcoming period. The Annual General Body meeting was held on 23 September 2023, during which the audited financial statement and the annual report for the year 2022-23 were published.



ANNUAL PLANNING OF CENTRAL TEAM

A two-day annual planning meeting was conducted on April 1st and 6th, 2024, at the CHASS conference hall to prepare the activity plan for the fiscal year 2024–25, in line with the decisions made in the Director Board and General Body meetings. The entire CHASS team, along with Fr. Thomas Kulathumkal (Director), Fr George Thycheril (Asst. Director), Fr George Panakezham (Asst. Director), and Mr Jobie Mathew (Programme Officer), collaboratively worked out the action plan and budget for the upcoming year.



CHASS FAMILY GATHERING

The annual get-together of the CHASS family was organized on 24 February 2024, at the Assumption College auditorium in Changanacherry, to evaluate the past year's performance and plan for the future. The meeting was inaugurated by Archbishop Mar Joseph Perumthottam and presided over by Msgr. Joseph Vaniapurackal, President of CHASS. Fr. Thomas Kulathumkal, Secretary of CHASS, delivered the keynote address, while Fr. George Panakezham (Assistant Director), Jobie Mathew (Programme Officer), and Saji Shaji (Staff Secretary) offered felicitations. 578 people participated in the event, including representatives of SHGs, farmers' clubs, CHASS local and regional units, the members of both General Body and Governing Body, and the staff members. An orientation talk on social service activities in the current context was delivered by Shiji Johnson of St. John's HSSS Nedumkunnam.



REGIONAL PME

CHASS organized regional planning, monitoring, and evaluation processes across its 14 regions to assess and monitor the ongoing programmes while planning for the future. These sessions aimed to strengthen and stabilize field-level involvements and initiatives. The presidents and secretaries of all local units within each region participated in the regional PME. During these sessions, the Director and the Programme Officer, evaluated the current functioning of the systems and provided guidance for future actions.

REVIEW MEETING

These meetings were held to evaluate and monitor the progress of the local units and their programmes, ensuring they are effectively functioning and are on track.

3. DEVELOPMENT TRAINING



CHASS follows a democratic functioning through grass root level community-based organizations. More than an operational link, these grass root organizations are visualized to delve deep into the community development interventions of the concerned village in a self-propelled and duly synthesized manner. It is placed on record here that the formation and activation of these village organizations entailed a lot of animation work and training of various types and grades.

4. SUSTAINABLE AGRICULTURE

The last four decades in Kerala's agriculture sector can indeed be described as a "Crisis Period," significantly impacting the village economy, which is heavily reliant on agriculture. In response to this crisis, CHASS has taken on the responsibility of intervening to promote Sustainable Agriculture. Recognizing the vital role agriculture plays in rural life, CHASS has implemented a comprehensive, multi-pronged intervention strategy aimed at addressing the various challenges faced by farmers and the agricultural sector as a whole. The key components of this strategy include:

- Farmers Dynamic Organizations & Networking
- Farmers Producers Companies
- Whole Farm Approach
- Organic Farming Practices
- Value added Product Processing and Storage
- Organized Marketing



These interventions by CHASS represent a comprehensive approach to addressing the agricultural crisis in Kerala, with a focus on sustainability, farmer empowerment, and improving the economic well-being of rural communities.

PROMOTION OF ORGANIC FARMING

CHASS is actively promoting food security and health security through a network of community-based organizations, including self-help groups, farmer's groups, and joint liability groups. Village level local social service units are spearheading a campaign focused on organic farming, emphasizing the use of value-added bio-manures and bio-pesticides to replace chemical fertilizers and pesticides. The initiative also prioritizes water and soil conservation through environment friendly practices. Additionally, the project encourages the cultivation of waste land and the substitution of food crops for cash crops. All CHASS units are participating in this collective effort to enhance sustainability and community well-being.



PREMIUM OUTLET (GRAMA BAZAR) CHANGANACHERRY

The Agriculture Department of Kerala allocated a Grama Bazar, a premium outlet, in Kottayam District as part of the Kerala Government's 2nd year celebrations. The initiative aims to promote the rural marketing of agricultural products of the self-help groups and farmers' clubs. The official inauguration of the Grama Bazar took place on May 25, 2023 by Adv. Job Michael, MLA. The event was marked by the presence of several dignitaries. Archbishop Mar Joseph Perumthottam blessed the Grama Bazar, signifying the community's support and good wishes for the success of this endeavour. The meeting was presided over by the Principal Agriculture Officer and several key personalities felicitated during the



occasion. The Grama Bazar in Kottayam represents a significant step towards empowering local farmers, promoting sustainable agriculture, and enhancing the visibility and marketability of rural products.

ENTE KERALAM EXPO



CHASS participated in the Ente Keralam expo held in Kottayam from 15-21 May 2023, organized by the Kerala Government as part of its second-year celebrations. At the expo, CHASS showcased a variety of agricultural products and items produced by SHGs, highlighting their contributions to the local economy and sustainable development.

ECO FRAGILE BUFFER ZONE FARMER'S GATHERING

CHASS, in collaboration with the Kerala Social Service Forum (KSSF), organized farmers' gathering at Amboori to discuss the exclusion of Aryankavu, Amboori, and the surrounding areas of Kollam and Trivandrum districts from the eco-fragile buffer zone demarcation. The meeting was presided over by Fr. Francis Karivelil, with the subject presented

by Fr. Mathewkutty Moonnattinmukham. KSSF Director, Fr. Jacob Mavunkal, delivered the keynote address, and Fr. Thomas Kulathumkal, Secretary of CHASS, gave the introductory speech. The panel discussions were moderated by Mr Jobie Mathew, Programme Officer of CHASS, and an input session was led by Ms Ancy, Agriculture Officer, Chenkal.

ONAM AGRI-FEST

CHASS organized an Agri-Fest from 26-28 August, 2023, at its compound in collaboration with local farmers' clubs and SHGs. The event featured a wide range of locally produced agricultural products, which were exhibited and marketed. The Onam Agri-Fest was inaugurated by Fr Joseph Vaniapurackal, the President of CHASS.

SUNDAY MARKETS

CHASS has been actively promoting Sunday markets to support local farmers by providing them with platforms to market their agricultural products. During the reporting period, five new Sunday markets were established. 23 Sunday markets are operating across 23 locations. These markets play a crucial role in enhancing the visibility and sales of locally produced goods, contributing to the economic well-being of the farming community.



CHASS NURSERY

CHASS operates an agricultural nursery within the central office compound. As part of its agri-promotion program for 2023–24, the nursery has distributed coconut saplings, banana saplings, fruit trees, grow bags, and vegetable seeds and saplings to 2,512 families. This initiative supports sustainable agriculture and encourages local food production among the community.



HARITHA SAMRUDHY

- Fish Farmer Producer Sangam: CHASS initiated a new Inland Fish Farmer Producer Sangam in Kuttanad to safeguard the interests of inland fish farmers of the region. The official inauguration of this unit took place on 20 April 2023, at the KRRIS centre in Mampuzhakary.
- Krishikoottam: CHASS collaborated with the Kerala Government's Krishikootam Padhathy and successfully formed three units at Kurumbanadom, Philgiri, and Changanacherry. These units are part of a broader effort to enhance agricultural practices and support local farmers through the Krishikootam initiative.
- Haritha Farmers clubs: The Haritha Farmer's Club, operating in CHASS local units, organized a farmers' meet where they distributed vegetable and fruit tree saplings free of cost to all their members.


SAMRUDHA AGRICULTURE DEVELOPMENT CENTRE

Samrudha Agriculture Nursery Kurumbanadom, established 40 years ago, serves as a demonstration farm and plant nursery in support of CHASS's agricultural programmes. Located in Kurumbanadom, a rural agricultural village 12 kilometers from the CHASS headquarters, Samrudha is dedicated to promote sustainable organic farming and safeguarding farmers' interests. The nursery is well-known for its demonstration plots featuring crops such as coconut, rubber, plantains, bananas, vegetables, roots and tubers, pepper, and ginger. During the reporting period, Samrudha extended its services to over 8,500 farmers through awareness creation, model farm development, and the supply of seeds, seedlings, grow bags, and other agricultural inputs.



5. NATURAL RESOURCE MANAGEMENT (NRM)

CHASS is dedicated to the sustainable development through watersheds and livelihoods initiatives, aligning with government and voluntary organization efforts that integrate science and technology. The organization's Natural Resource Management programme focuses on enhancing the natural resource base through various physical initiatives, including ring and pipe composting, rainwater harvesting, well recharging, agro-forestry, herbal cultivation, and no-plastic campaign. These efforts collectively contribute to improving soil health, water conservation, and environmental sustainability.



WATER CONSERVATION

Under its Natural Resource Management (NRM) activities, CHASS prioritizes water conservation. The organization promotes rainwater harvesting through several methods, including the construction of Ferro cement water tanks, tarpaulin tanks, well recharging, backwashing, and also cleaning and protecting water sources to ensure effective water source regeneration. Other activities include agro forestry and herbal cultivation.

ENVIRONMENT DAY OBSERVATIONS Central Level Programme

CHASS celebrated International Environment Day at its office on 6 June 2023. The event was inaugurated by Fr Thomas Kulathumkal, with an Environment Day message delivered by Fr George Thycheril. The occasion featured an environment seminar led by Mr Jobie Mathew. A flash mob performance by MSW students from Assumption College highlighted the importance of environmental harmony. Mrs Saji Shaji, Staff Secretary, concluded the event with a vote of thanks.





Unit Level Programmes

CHASS local units organized a series of activities including a Self-Help Group (SHG) get-together, awareness programmes, and initiatives to clean public places and water bodies to mark the World Environment Day 2023. Additionally, they engaged in tree planting and distributed vegetable seeds.



GANDHI JAYANTI DAY OBSERVATION

CHASS observed Gandhi Jayanti 2023 in alignment with the Central Government's "Waste-Free India: Hygiene is Service" initiative. The cleaning programmes initiated by CHASS were inaugurated by Mar. Sebastian Vaniapurackal, Curia Bishop of the Syro Malabar Church. The observance focused on promoting cleanliness and hygiene in honour of Mahatma Gandhi's legacy.



6. WOMEN AND CHILDREN

The involvement of women in CHASS is significant, as they are the major participants actively engaged in grass root level activities. Recognizing the importance of their role, a specialized initiative has been established to support and empower these women. This initiative is called Associated Women's Action for Rural Development (AWARD), and it serves as a network that connects all the micro-organizational bodies involved.

MAHILASAMAJAMS

In the villages (parishes), women's SHGs are organized and coordinated under a federated body known as Mahilasamajam. Currently, there are 93 Mahilasamajams actively operating under the framework of CHASS. These Mahilasamajams are further federated under a central-level network called Associated Women's Action for Rural Development (AWARD). The Mahilasamajams engage in various activities to empower women and address community needs. Their major activities include:

- Monthly Meetings
- Skill and Entrepreneurship Development Programme (EDP) Training
- Coordination of Women SHG Activities
- Promotion of Income-Generating Projects (IGP)

These efforts collectively contribute to the socio-economic development of women in rural areas, ensuring their active participation in community-building initiatives.



WOMEN'S DAY OBSERVATION (EVA 2024)

International Women's Day, "Eva 2024," was observed by CHASS in collaboration with local units on March 9, 2024, at Archbishop Kavukattu Hall, SB College Changanacherry. The event marked a range of programmes, including orientation talks, cultural performances, public meetings, celebrating the contributions of women in various fields. Mrs. Rani Maria, Vice Principal of Assumption College, delivered the Women's Day message, and the event was inaugurated jointly by Adv. Sajitha TP, a prominent women entrepreneur, Mrs. K.N. Sheeba, a theatre activist, and Mrs. Krupa Ligin, a special educator.

Archbishop Mar Joseph Perumthottam delivered a benedictory message, and felicitations were given by key persons including Rev. Fr. Joseph Vaniapurackal, Fr. Thomas Kulathumkal, and Mrs. Alphonse Varghese,

President of AWARD. Sr. Alphy DSJ, Administrative Officer of CHASS, warmly welcomed all.

During the event, outstanding women social workers and entrepreneurs were honoured for their achievements. The day also included various entertainment activities and competitions, offering women a platform to showcase their talents and celebrate their successes.

a. VALARTHUKOOTTAM

CHASS plays a vital role in supporting local farmers by offering both technical and practical assistance. This includes the distribution of chicks, ducklings, lambs, kidari, and other livestock at subsidized rates to encourage agricultural activities. Beyond the provision of resources, CHASS ensures that farmers have access to financial support through SHGs, microcredit unions, the Kerala State Backward Classes Development Corporation (KSBCDC), and other financial organizations on a reasonable interest rate.

CHASS also has promoted Sunday markets and nattuchanda (traditional village markets), through its local units, enabling them to market their products directly at the grass root level. In the fiscal year 2023-24, a significant impact was made through the Valarthukoottam Programme, 1765 families receiving support.

SANCHARI SKILL TRAINING



CHASS is conducting a three-month special skill-training program specifically designed for women who are members of SHG, offering them the opportunity to learn and develop new skills within their local communities. During the reporting year, 618 women successfully completed the training in 19 batches. The training covers a wide range of practical and creative skills, including:

- Cutting and tailoring
- Hand embroidery
- Doormat making
- Ornament making
- Flower making
- Umbrella making
- Washing powder making
- Toilet soap making
- Liquid soap making
- Door curtain making Liquid blue making
 - Lotion making

SANCHARI SKILL TRAINING

During the reporting period, CHASS conducted 15 programmes on different trades and over 571 members benefited from the programme. CHASS is running a Swasraya market in order to ensure regular supply of raw materials to the EDP units. The objective of the activity is to direct the people towards a self-reliant growth.

COLLABORATION WITH KSBCDC

CHASS has established a network with several financial institutions to integrate microfinance facilities into Self-Help Groups, aiming to bolster their livelihood initiatives. The primary objective of this network is to provide low-interest loans to SHGs, thereby enhancing their profitability and supporting their economic activities.

One of the key partners in this initiative is the Kerala State Backward Community Development Corporation (KSBCDC). With the assistance of KSB-CDC, CHASS has facilitated the provision of loans amounting to Rs. 1.5 crores for the establishment of Income-Generating Projects in 30 SHG groups.

Archbishop Mar Joseph Perumthottam officially inaugurated the KSBCDC Loan Mela on 6 March 2024, at the CHASS conference hall. Fr. Joseph Vaniapurackal, presided over the function, and introduction speech was given by Fr. Thomas Kulathumkal. The keynote address was delivered by Sri. Shaji A. R, Assistant Manager of KSBCDC Kottayam, who provided insights into the role of KSBCDC in facilitating microfinance and the benefits it offers to SHGs and other participants.



COOPERATIVE TAILORING CENTRE (COPTAC)

COPTAC, established in 1975, holds the distinction of being the oldest undertaking of CHASS. Situated near CHASS's administrative office, the centre trains women in tailoring and embroidery under the Kerala Government Technical Examination (KGTE) scheme and undertakes garment production. Each year, 50 girls complete their training at this centre and receive certificates, and the production wing of the centre employs 35 women, providing them with stable employment opportunities.

The production unit has a partnership with the Khadi programme, where the cloth produced under Khadi is tailored into ready-made garments at COPTAC. A distinctive feature of the tailoring work carried out at this centre is the large-scale production of vestments and cassocks, which has earned the institution a reputable name across the country.





8. KHADI AND VILLAGE INDUSTRIES PROGRAMME

Khadi is handmade, hand spun and hand-woven cotton/silk fabric made by thousands of skilled artisans living in rural areas. Khadi is cool in summer and warm in winter, soft feel texture and versatile fabric and truly environment friendly fabric suitable for all types of season. The fabric got its importance from our Father of Nation, Mahatma Gandhi.

CHASS started Khadi & Village Industries (VI) Programme in the year 1977 with the financial assistance of Kerala Khadi & VI Board. In the year 1983, Khadi & VI Commission, Govt. of India included CHASS in their direct list.

We have expanded the Khadi & VI Programme on a "three tier system" namely Training, Production and Marketing. The main focus of CHASS through KVI Programme is to provide employment to rural people in villages, creating self-reliance and building up a strong rural community with the support of KVIC.

TRAINING PROGRAMME

CHASS started Khadi Gramodyog Vidyalaya (KGV) at Mallappally in the year 1986. At present, 21 training programmes are ongoing regularly at KGV Mallappally and its various extension centers. Around 2500-3000 candidates complete their training from the vidyalaya every year.

9. SOCIAL SECURITY MEASURES

JEEVAN MADHUR MICRO INSURANCE PROGRAMME

CHASS is affiliated with the Life Insurance Corporation of India to offer insurance protection to marginalized and excluded families through the Jeevan Madhur micro-insurance programme. This programme, initiated by CHASS 18 years ago, has successfully enrolled over 25000 families. Of these, approximately 22000 families have successfully completed the assured policy period and received their benefits from LIC.

MUTUAL BENEFIT SCHEME

The Mutual Benefit Scheme, part of the CHASS Micro Finance Programme, is a death coverage and medical support initiative designed exclusively for its active members. Under this scheme, CHASS provides financial assistance of Rs. 10,000 to the family of a member upon his/her death. In the current year, CHASS has contributed a total of Rs. 18,00,000 to support 180 families facing such a loss. Additionally, the scheme also offers medical aid to 65 members, with a total of Rs. 3,10,000 for medical assistance during the same period. This programme is a significant support system for members, offering both financial relief during times of bereavement and assistance with healthcare costs.

SHG SURAKSHA FUND

The SHG Suraksha Fund is a social security scheme promoted by CHASS specifically for its SHG members. This fund is designed to help members' families manage unexpected expenses that arise due to the death of a member. In the current year, 45 families were supported through this programme, receiving a total of Rs. 4,50,000.

HEALTH INSURANCE

28 families received Rs. 180,295/- as medical expense reimbursement from Health Insurance programme promoted by CHASS in collaboration with New India Assurance Company.

10. FAMILY DEVELOPMENT

SAVE A FAMILY PLAN

CHASS has been collaborating with Save a Family Plan (SAFP) Canada, an international donor agency, for the past 54 years to support the social integration of poor and marginalized families in Kerala. Through this partnership, CHASS has helped thousands of families implement livelihood programmes, manage natural resources, and engage in other developmental activities. Currently, 210 families are part of this programme, receiving a monthly sum of Rs. 1200 each. This financial support is crucial for these families, enabling them to invest in income-generating activities, fund their children's education, and meet essential needs. Over a six-year period, this assistance fosters self-reliance, helping families establish micro-enterprises and secure a stable income, contributing to their longterm well-being. Three beneficiaries received Rs 300000 as part of COVID rehabilitation project.

CLUSTER MEETING AND MONITORING

CHASS organized cluster meetings of FDP partner families at eight different locations to promote new income-generating programs (IGPs) and evaluate existing IGP units. During these meetings, the CHASS team, including the FDP coordinator and regional coordinators, conducted house visits and interacted with family members.



FFT MEETING

CHASS conducted FFT meetings with the participation of the Director, Assistant Director, Program Officer, and FDP Coordinator to evaluate the ongoing projects and develop a plan of action for future interventions.

CARE A FAMILY PROGRAMME

The "Care a Family" program, initiated by CHASS, is a locally sponsored initiative aimed at integrating marginalized families into the social mainstream, particularly those without an earning member. This Family Development Programme focuses on the holistic development of partner families by channelling a monthly contribution of Rs. 1000 into income-generating activities, children's education, and other essential needs that contribute to the families' sustained well-being for over a sixyear period. The programme is fully supported by well-wishers of CHASS within the operational area. This year, 25 of the most deserving families received support through this initiative.





11. COMMUNITY BASED REHABILITATION OF DIFFERENTLY ABLED

In 1999, CHASS established a separate department focused on the upliftment of Persons with Disabilities (PwDs), in collaboration with the CBR Forum in Bangalore. Since then, CHASS has continued its committed service to support the Differently Abled through various programmes designed to enhance their quality of life and promote their integration into society.

REHASWISS PROGRAM ME

In collaboration with Rehaswiss, an international funding agency based in Switzerland that focuses on the sustainable development of differently abled individuals, CHASS provided financial support for Income Generating Programmes to 30 people during the 2023–24 period. Along with this, a skill training and awareness programme was also organized for the siblings of the differently abled.

The IGP support for the year 2023–24 was inaugurated on 16 August 2023, at the CHASS conference hall by His Grace Mar Joseph Perumthottam, Archbishop of Changanacherry. The event was presided over by Fr. Joseph Vaniapurackal, President, with a keynote address was delivered by Fr. Thomas Kulathumkal, Director. Mr. Jobie Mathew, Programme Officer, provided an explanation of the project. Fe-

licitations were offered by Fr. George Thycheril, Assistant Director of CHASS, Mrs. Saji Shaji, and Mrs. Sheeba Santhosh.

Under this programme, CHASS disbursed a total of Rs. 5,00,000 to 30 differently abled individuals as support for their IGPs, marking a significant step in empowering these individuals towards self-reliance and social inclusion.

ASHA TALENT PROMOTION

Asha Talent Promotion is a dream project of Rehaswiss to upgrade the talents of the differently abled women by initiating their creativity and work culture for better result and to improve their own income through innovative projects. The main objective of the project is to promote the creativity and talent of the differently abled by providing innovative impulses and inspiration. The project aims to give financial independence and empowerment for PwDs, particularly women, through tailoring and product export to Switzerland

ASSISSI VIDYALAYAM POONTHPOE



Assissi Vidyalaya, a special school for children with mental retardation, was established in 1992 in the densely populated coastal town of Poonthope, Alappuzha. The school is owned and managed by the Changanacherry Social Service Society, and during the reporting year it catered to 72 children with various forms of retardation. It operates with the support and guidance of the Directorate of Public Instruction (DPI) of the Government of Kerala, ensuring effective management and operation of the school.

Ashakiranam Cancer Care Programme Changanacherry is a joint campaign of CHASS and Caritas India for the prevention and mitigation of cancer and other lifestyle diseases. The Coordinator of Ashakiranam Cancer Care Programme participates regularly in the DLO training conducted by Caritas India.

PROMOTION OF ORGANIC KITCHEN GARDENING



Ashakiranam wing joined the agriculture development programme of CHASS and helped 543 families to start organic kitchen gardening. Regular accompaniment and support from the CHASS local unit helped them to produce and consume homemade toxic free vegetables, roots, tubers, and fruits.

AIDS DAY OBSERVATION

Ashakiranam Cancer Care wing observed AIDS Day on December 1st in collaboration with Assumption College Changanacherry.



WORLD CANCER DAY OBSERVATION



CHASS organized a comprehensive one-day orientation programme and medical camp across seven locations in collaboration with the Community Medicine Department of Pushpagiri Medical College, Thiruvalla. The event was led by Dr. Betsy Jose and Dr. Dency David, along with a dedicated medical team of nine members from the college. This initiative provided valuable health education and medical services to the community, addressing both awareness and direct healthcare needs.



LIVE FREE COTTON SANITARY PAD

The "Live Free" reusable cotton sanitary pad, developed by the Ashakiranam desk of CHASS, has gained significant popularity among women in Kerala, especially those in Central Travancore. This product stands out for its softness, hygiene, reusability, non-allergenic properties, natural composition, and affordability. Made from high-quality

cotton cloth, it incorporates non-leaking technology to ensure safety and comfort. The fact that it is reusable makes it an environment friendly option, aligning with CHASS's commitment to effective waste management. A dedicated team of ten women at the COPTAC is fully involved in the production of these sanitary pads. This initiative not only



addresses waste management concerns but also promotes healthy practices among women, particularly teenagers. By offering a safer and more sustainable option, CHASS aims to reduce the risk of chronic diseases like cervical cancer, making a significant impact on women's health and well-being. 300 pads we distributed during the reporting period.

GRAHALAKSHMI HOME NURSING SERVICE

The home nursing service provided by the Society, which caters to families with bed-ridden patients who require professional nursing care is a different health care service. This service operates under specific terms and conditions mutually agreed upon with the families. The Society employs five trained

home nurses who are available on a rotating basis to ensure continuous care. During the reporting year 25 individuals benefited from the compassionate and professional care provided by the home nurses. This service plays a crucial role in supporting families during challenging times.

SAJEEVAM ANTI-DRUG CAMPAIGN



The Sajeevam anti-drug campaign is a collaborative initiative together with Caritas India, the Kerala Social Service Forum, and CHASS. This campaign is designed to raise awareness among parents and the general public about the growing influence of drug mafias on children and to mobilize collective efforts to combat this menace. By engaging all diocesan departments in this fight, the campaign seeks to build a robust network of support and education, empowering communities to protect their children and resist the destructive impact of drugs.

On 21st June 2023, the Sajeevam desk organized a poster making competition for school children at St. Anne's Higher Secondary School, Changanacherry. The competition focused on the theme "Measures to Be Adopted for Preventing Drug Abuse." CHASS organized a series of awareness classes on drug abuse prevention, for Sunday school students across 15 parishes. These sessions were designed to educate young minds about the dangers of drug abuse and the importance of making informed choices.

Human Chain all over Kerala.

SLCA-Kernla, in collaboration with the parent NGO CHASS, organized a human chain across five civil districts in south and south-central Kerala. 180 communities are expected and a cosmolidated participation of more than 75,000 people in the Human Chain participated on June 25, 2023.

In addition to this, SLCA Kerala anticipated the assistance from other NGOs operating under the asspices of the Kerala Catholic Bishops Council (KCBC) in coordinating the human chain throughout Kerala's northern and central regions, with an anticipated participation of 1,50,000 people. It is also expected to spread the message to about 450,000 people indirectly.

Signature Campaign

A signature campaign against drug abuse was organized, in collaboration with the parent NGO CHASS as part of the observation of International Day against Deug Abuse and Illicit Trafficking. Around 12000 signatures were collected. It is also expected to spread the message to about 15,000 people indirectly.

INTEGRATED REHABILITATION CENTRES FOR ADDICTS (IRCAs)

The ACCEPT Counselling and De-addiction Centres, operated by the Changanacherry Social Service Society (CHASS), have a long history of providing vital support to individuals struggling with alcohol and drug addiction in Alappuzha District, Kerala. Originally established as a counselling centre for alcoholics and drug addicts at Punnapra, the centre has undergone several relocations and transformations to better serve the community.

Key Historical Milestones:

Punnapra (Initial Location): The ACCEPT Counselling Centre was first established at Punnapra in Alappuzha District on 03 February 1990. CHASS, known for its pioneering work in social services,

managed the centre with an unblemished record of service.

Kaithavana (1993-2001): In 1993, the centre was shifted to Kaithavana, continuing its role as a counselling and drug awareness centre until 31 March 2001.

Nooranadu (2001): On 01 April 2001, the centre was moved to Nooranadu, Alappuzha District, which had the highest suicide rate due to alcohol and drug abuse. During this time, the centre was renamed as ACCEPT De-addiction Centre on 01 August 2001, following a grant-in-aid from the Ministry of Social Justice and Empowerment's Integrated Rehabilitation Centres (IRCAs).

Kattanam (2003-Present): Due to water scarcity at Nooranadu, the centre was relocated on 01 April 2003, to Kattanam, a nearby village. It now operates as the ACCEPT De-addiction Centre Kattanam, supported by the 300-bed multi-specialty St. Thomas Mission Hospital on the same campus. Punnapra (1997-Present): In addition to the Kattanam centre, CHASS started the ACCEPT De-addiction Centre at Punnapra in 1997, which continues to receive grant-in-aid from the Ministry of Social

Justice and Empowerment, Government of India. These centres play a crucial role in combating addiction in Alappuzha District, supported by the de-addiction initiatives of CHASS and the resources provided by the Ministry of Social Justice and Empowerment. The ACCEPT centres have planned a range of activities for the year 2023-2024, focusing on comprehensive de-addiction services, including:

SUPPORT PERSONS MEET

Supportive persons meeting at ACCEPT IRCA is a gathering designed specifically for the friends and relatives of individuals undergoing treatment for alcohol dependency syndrome. These meetings are held regularly to provide essential support and guidance to the loved ones of those in recovery. The meeting takes place on every first Sunday of the month at ACCEPT IRCA, Punnapra and the same meeting is held on every last Sunday of the month at ACCEPT IRCA, Kattanam. There are lectures, group discussions, and counselling sessions with family members.

Main Objectives of the programme are:

- To mobilize psychosocial support for patients among family members and friends, particularly in their sober lives.
- To clarify the myths, misconceptions, and facts about addiction treatment, sober life, and follow-up.
- To help the friends and relatives identify their role in a sober life.

14. WELFARE AND CHARITY

As a social organization dedicated to supporting the poor and needy, CHASS frequently encounters urgent human situations that require immediate and compassionate intervention, despite its focus on promoting self-reliance and community-based support. To address these critical needs, the Archdiocese provides a local charity fund for selective personal charity. On average, CHASS processes around 100 requests per month, with over Rs. 13,50,000 allocated during the reporting year to offer timely assistance and relief to those in dire circumstances.
