

Changanacherry Social Service Society (CHASS) is an initiative of the Archdiocese of Changanacherry in conformity with the statutory provisions, having been registered under the Travancore Cochin Charitable Societies Act XII of 1955. Established in the year 1966, the Society has by now completed 59 years, passing through a disciplined process of learning and evolution. Accordingly, the present CHASS is a democratic set up with an inbuilt central mechanism with accountability to the People, the Government and the Archdiocese as well. The Society has a democratic set up having its General Body constituted of village representatives, parish priests, subject experts, and specially nominated persons by the patron Archbishop. In this respect, the Society is built upon a substantial people's organisational base at the village level; the most important among them being village level Social Service Trusts, Mahilasamajams, Credit Unions, Self-Help Groups and Farmers Clubs. The area of operation is extended to five civil districts viz. Kottayam, Alappuzha, Pathanamthitta, Kollam and Thiruvananthapuram of the State of Kerala.

PLANNING AND GOVERNANCE

Effective planning and robust governance form the backbone of our organization’s mission-driven work. At CHASS, we are committed to transparency, accountability, and participatory decision-making in all aspects of our operations. During this year, our strategic planning processes were further strengthened through inclusive consultations, timely evaluations and adaptive responses to emerging community needs. The governance structure-anchored by our Board of Directors and guided by our core values-ensured ethical leadership, efficient resource management, and alignment with statutory regulations. Through sound planning and governance, we continue to uphold the trust placed in us by our stakeholders and remain focused on delivering impactful, sustainable development outcomes.

GOVERNING BOARD AND GENERAL BODY MEETING

During the reporting period, the Governing Board provided strategic guidance and oversight through regular meetings, ensuring transparency and alignment with the organization’s mission. The Board met on 11 May 2024, 10 August 2024, 2 October 2024, 12 February 2025, and 20 March 2025 to review programmes, assess progress, and make key decisions. In addition, the General Body Meeting was convened on 13 September 2025, facilitating wider participation and discussion on the organization’s performance, future plans, and policy directions.



ANNUAL PLANNING MEETING

In order to review the activities of 2023-24, plan programs for 2024-25, and formulate the annual budget, an Annual Planning Meeting was held at the SLCA Conference Hall on May 6, 7, 8, and 15, 2024. All Directors and staff members actively participated in the sessions, contributing to a collaborative and strategic planning process. The meeting featured an insightful input session by Dr. V. R. Haridas, NRM Manager, Caritas India, who shared valuable perspectives on integrated development and resource management, further enriching the planning process

REGIONAL EXECUTIVE

To plan the regional-level activities for the current year and evaluate the performance and impact of the previous year's initiatives, regional executive meetings were conducted in each region. These meetings brought together regional executive members and regional coordinators, providing a platform for collaborative planning, review, and strategy development. The discussions focused on strengthening program implementation, addressing local challenges, and ensuring alignment with the overall goals of CHASS.

REGIONAL PME

CHASS conducted regional Planning, Monitoring, and Evaluation (PME) sessions across its 15 regions to assess on-going programmes and chart future directions. These sessions were designed to reinforce and stabilize grassroots-level initiatives and engagements. Presidents and secretaries from all local units within each region actively participated in the process. During the sessions, the Director and Programme Officer evaluated the operational effectiveness of current systems and offered strategic guidance to enhance future activities. In the reporting year, two regional PME meetings were held in each region.

HALF YEARLY MEETING

COMMUNITY BASED ORGANIZATIONS

Community Based Organisation plays an important and relevant role in providing service at grass roots. It is a non-profit organization whose programs and activities are based primarily through the dedicated commitment of volunteers. CBO is the core of any social work agency which performs as the local set of the organization at the grass roots. CHASS represents different functional grassroots organizations of stakeholders, namely, self-help groups, Mahila samajams, Farmers clubs and Credit Union. In the current year we have 75500 marginalized rural poor have been organizationally lined up duly substantiated by awareness and specific functions geared to self-reliant development. As a facilitator CHASS conducts interactive meetings, training programs on relevant topics, financial planning, etc. Moreover, CHASS promotes participatory action research, dissemination of best practices etc., among the CBO members.

LOCAL SOCIAL SERVICE TRUSTS

Village level Local Social Service Trusts of CHASS are the apex body of all the grass roots level people's organizations functioning under the banner of CHASS. The Governing body of the CHASS local unit is duly constituted by the elected representatives of all the CSOs functioning under this umbrella. CHASS works through 153 local units at parish level duly monitored by the parish priest which in turn is supported by the regional coordinator of CHASS. These units are the functional structure of CHASS at the grassroots. These local units are networked to 15 Region level units functioning under the banner of CHASS. Local Trusts support CHASS to identify and prioritize the problems or issues at the village level to plan, implement and evaluate the projects and programs. They also undertake welfare activities as well as developmental initiatives in their own capacity.




SELF HELP GROUPS

A SHG may be registered or unregistered. It typically comprises a group of micro entrepreneurs having homogeneous social and economic backgrounds; all voluntarily coming together to save small sums of money on a regular basis, mutually agreeing to contribute to a common fund and to meet their emergency needs on the basis of mutual help. They pool their resources to become financially stable, taking loans from the money collected by that group and by making everybody in that group self-employed. The group members use collective wisdom and peer pressure to ensure proper end-use of credit and timely repayment. Self Help Group (SHG) is a neighborhood fraternity of likeminded people with common objectives; they are facilitated to come together to participate in the development activities such as mutual learning and cooperation, thrift & saving, credit and income generation thereby ensuring economic independence. It is a grassroots level people's organization mainly intended to mobilize human resource for community development. SHG phenomenon definitely augments group consciousness among members, a sense of belongingness, mutual understanding, self-respect, sense of public participation, the enlarged horizon of social involvements and adequate self-confidence.




SELF HELP GROUP

COLLABORATION WITH KSBCDC

To further empower Self-Help Groups (SHGs) and support their income-generating activities, CHASS has established strategic partnerships with various financial institutions to integrate microfinance facilities into SHG networks. This initiative aims to improve access to low-interest credit, thereby enhancing the financial sustainability and profitability of SHG-led livelihood projects. A key partner in this endeavour is the Kerala State Backward Classes Development Corporation (KSBCDC). Through this collaboration, CHASS successfully facilitated loans totaling Rs 2.4 crores, enabling the launch and expansion of 63 income-generating projects across SHG groups. These financial link ages play a crucial role in fostering entrepreneurship, economic independence, and long-term community development.



JOINT LIABILITY GROUPS (JLGs)

Joint Liability Groups (JLGs) are formed by selecting three to five members from Self-Help Groups (SHGs). They serve as an effective tool to increase the flow of credit to farmers, particularly small and marginal tenant farmers, as well as oral lessees involved in farming activities. Currently, there are 167 JLGs functioning under CHASS.



CHASS CREDIT UNION

Micro Finance Development cum Community Banking

CHASS has successfully promoted and popularized a community banking system through a well-oiled Credit Union Program networked by 138 Village Credit Unions making the rural economy vibrant. This also provides a significant mass base for the Society in all its participatory processes of community development. The majority of the population in this segment of the poorest, roughly 80% are constantly in need of small loans for sustaining their existing employment, for generation of further employment as also for meeting varied personal and social needs. The poorest among the poor need loans of very small amounts, but their requirement is quick delivery of loans at their door steps. Traditionally, private money lenders have been playing this role but their intention has been to exploit the poor instead of helping them and this rather worsened the plight of the poor. Over a period of time the significance of provisions of credit as an instrument of socioeconomic change and developments is being realized and many national organizations, including banks have come up to provide soft loans to the poor in order to free them from the clutches of private money lenders. CHASS credit union covers 138 villages of Changanacherry Social Service Society and more than 31560 families and 550 SHGs are direct members of this grass roots network.




SOCIAL SECURITY SCHEMES

CHASS is committed to promoting social justice by extending timely support to individuals and families facing financial and personal hardships. As part of our social security efforts, we implemented arrange of support mechanisms for marginalized communities. These initiatives aim to reduce vulnerability, provide relief during crises, and offer a sense of stability and protection to those in need. Through these measures, CHASS continues to uphold its mission of fostering inclusive and resilient communities.

MUTUAL BENEFIT SCHEME

The Mutual Benefit Scheme, part of the CHASS Micro Finance Programme, is a death coverage and medical support Initiative designed exclusively for its Active members. Under this scheme, CHASS provides financial assistance of Rs.10,000 to the family of a member Up on his/her death. In the reporting year, CHASS has contributed a total of Rs.16,70,000 to support 167 families.



SHG DEATH FUND

The SHG Death Fund is a social security scheme promoted by CHASS specifically for its SHG members. Under this scheme, CHASS provides financial assistance of Rs. 20,000 to the family of a member upon his/her death. In the current year, 39 families were supported through this programme, receiving a total of Rs. 7,80,000

HEALTH INSURANCE SCHEME

This is a health insurance program specially designed for the lower middle class and BPL families in collaboration with New India Assurance Company This year 22 families received Rs. 75000 as medical expense reimbursement from New India Assurance Company.



AGAPE HOUSING AID

A safe dwelling place is every one's dream. Moreover, it is one of the basic needs of every human being viz. food, clothing and shelter. In this sense it is the right of every individual to live in a safe, secure house together with kith and kin. This basic right is not often fulfilled in the case of a good number of unfortunate families. A large number of poor and marginalized are still far from realizing this ardent desire. We remember with gratitude the role- played by Christus ko nig Kirche, Broken-Germen for the last several years in resolving the issue of shelter in the arch diocese. During this report period, 6 families are assisted for house construction through the housing scheme.

CARE A FAMILY PROJECT

The Care a Family program, by CHASS, is a locally sponsored initiative designed to integrate marginalized families particularly those without an earning member, into the social mainstream. This Family Development Programme supports the holistic growth of partner families by providing annual contributions of Rs 10,000 over a three-year period. These funds are allocated toward income-generating activities, children's education, and other essential needs, ensuring sustained improvements in family well-being. Each year, we identify potential beneficiary families, and from among these, the most deserving 18 were selected this year. This year's participants are engaged in a variety of productive activities, including goat farming, buffalo farming, poultry, small retail shops, evening tea stalls, tailoring, and clothing sales. Annual home visits are conducted to assess their progress and ensure the effectiveness of the support provided. The program currently includes families from the Kottayam, Manimala, Changanacherry and Kollam regions. Beneficiary families are not required to repay the funds, making this initiative a powerful catalyst for socio-economic upliftment and social inclusion.



ASHAKIRANAM CANCER CARE PROGRAMME

The Asha Kiranam Cancer Care Programme is a holistic initiative by CHASS aimed at raising awareness, promoting prevention, and facilitating early detection of cancer within the community. The programme encompasses a variety of activities including awareness classes on cancer prevention, the promotion of cotton sanitary napkins to encourage safe menstrual hygiene, and the encouragement of organic kitchen gardening as a step toward healthy, chemical-free living. It also includes cancer screening camps to aid nearly diagnosis and timely treatment, as well as hair donation campaigns to show solidarity and support for individuals undergoing cancer treatment. Through these integrated efforts, Asha Kiranam continues to foster health awareness and compassion at care at the grass roots level.





LIVE FREE COTTON SANITARY PAD



The "Live Free" reusable cotton sanitary pad, developed by the Ashakiranam desk of CHASS, has gained significant popularity among women in Kerala, especially those in Central Travancore. This product stands out for its softness, hygiene, reusability, non-allergenic properties, natural composition, and affordability. Made from high-quality cotton cloth, it incorporates non-leaking technology to ensure safety and comfort. The fact that it is reusable makes it an environment friendly option, aligning with CHASS's commitment to effective waste management. A dedicated team often works with women at the COPTAC, fully involved in the production of these sanitary pads. This initiative not only addresses waste management concerns but also promotes healthy practices among women, particularly teenagers. By offering a safer and more sustainable option, CHASS aims to reduce the risk of chronic diseases like cervical cancer, making a significant impact on women's health and well-being. 3000 pads were distributed during the reporting period.

EDUCARE PROJECT

CHASS continues its commitment to education through the Interest-Free Loan Program for Higher Education, supporting students from economically disadvantaged families. This initiative enables deserving youth to pursue academic goals without financial strain. By removing interest burdens, the program not only promotes individual growth but also contributes to community development through education-led empowerment.



SAVE A FAMILY PROJECT

CHASS has been collaborating with Save a Family Plan (SAFP) Canada, an international donor agency, for the past 55 years to support the social integration of poor and marginalized families in Kerala. Through this partnership, CHASS has helped thousands of families implement livelihood programmes, manage natural resources, and engage in other developmental activities. Currently, 216 families are part of this programme, receiving a monthly sum of Rs. 1200 each. This financial support is crucial for these families, enabling them to invest in income-generating activities, fund their children's education, and meet essential needs. Over a six-year period, this assistance fosters self-reliance, helping families establish micro-enterprises and secure a stable income, contributing to their long-term well-being. As part of the Save a Family Programme, 12 clusters were formed in our operational area and meetings were held at different locations during the reporting period. The objectives of these meetings are to provide training sessions on different topics, to provide general instructions and guidelines, to strengthen the relationship among partner families and to share partner families' experience. The SAFP coordinator visits the partner families to evaluate the progress of their income generating activities. During the reporting period the coordinator visited 200 partner families and monitored their small business initiatives. The enduring partnership between CHASS and Save a Family Plan Canada has significantly uplifted the lives of marginalized families for the past years. The program's holistic approach encompassing financial support, capacity- building, and community engagement has empowered families to achieve self-reliance and sustain able livelihoods. As the program continues to evolve, its sustained success stands as a testament to the transformative power of collaborative efforts in fostering long-term well-being and resilience among vulnerable communities.



COMMUNITY BASED REHABILITATION (CBR)

Community Based Rehabilitation (CBR) has been advocated internationally for a decade as the core strategy for improvement of the quality of life of differently abled persons. They should be active partners in the planning and implementation of all measures affecting their civil, political, economic, social and cultural rights; but very often, the right to civilized life is often denied which frequently lands the disabled into an incessant, vicious loop so that there arises an absolute and urgent need for their complete rehabilitation. The vision is to bring up the disabled persons into the mainstream of the society with community participation and involvement. And the mission is to enhance the quality of life of the disabled individuals and create social awareness about their problems. For many years, the concern for the disabled persons had been expressed by the CHASS in different ways, mostly through sponsorship and running special institutions for their care. However, the approach has undergone a desirable change with the introduction of community-based rehabilitation in the year 1995 and established a separate department focused on the upliftment of Persons with Disabilities (PWDs), in collaboration with the CBR Forum in Bangalore. Since then, CHASS has continued its committed service to support the Differently Abled through various programs designed to enhance their quality of life and promote their integration into society.

COLLABORATION WITH REHASWISS

CHASS has partnered with Rehaswiss, an international donor agency based in Switzerland that works exclusively for the welfare of differently abled individuals. This meaningful collaboration has enabled CHASS to support an average of 50 differently abled persons every year through various income generation programmes. Through these initiatives, CHASS and Rehaswiss aim to foster dignity, self-reliance, and long-term economic stability for differently abled individuals in our communities. Currently, this support is extended through three key projects, detailed below.

EMPOWERING THE DIFFERENTLY-ABLED

CHASS provided financial support to 30 differently-abled individuals to start or strengthen income-generating activities. The project is aimed at helping these individuals and their families achieve economic self-sufficiency. Following the approval, CHASS organized a planning meeting to chart out the implementation strategy. The CHASS team visited the homes of all 20 beneficiaries across 12 villages in our operational areas. These visits helped evaluate the practicality and effectiveness of the proposed Income Generating Projects (IGPs). A fund disbursement meeting was held on 10 September 2024 at the CHASS central office. Mr. Job Michael, MLA of Changanacherry, inaugurated the event, which attracted 53 participants. Project funds were officially handed over to the 20 beneficiaries, and orientation was provided by Fr. Jince Choretta Chamakala, Assistant Director of CHASS.



REHASWISS TEAM VISIT

A team from Rehaswiss, including Rehaswiss India Director Mr. Joseph Aerthott and committee members from Switzerland, conducted field visits twice and interacted with the beneficiaries in order to assess the impact of the project. The first visit took place on 19 November 2024, followed by a second visit on 3 and 4 January 2025. During these visits, the team interacted with beneficiaries who had effectively utilized the support received, reviewed the progress of their income-generating activities, and offered valuable feedback for future improvements. These visits reaffirmed the positive outcomes of the project and strengthened the on-going collaboration between CHASS and Rehaswiss.



ASHA TALENT PROMOTION

Asha Talent, REHASWISS's dream project, aims to empower differently-abled women by fostering their creativity, skill and work culture, ultimately enhancing their income through innovative initiatives. The project's primary goal is to nurture and show case the creativity and talents of differently-abled individuals by offering fresh ideas and inspiration. The Asha Talent Project for Differently Abled Women, located in Vadavathoor, Kottayam, is progressing well under CHASS with sponsorship from Rehaswiss. The project is seeing positive results, including increased wages for the differently-abled women involved. Over the past year, six differently-abled women have been engaged in skill-based tailoring work using cotton materials. On busy days, one more woman joins the team as part-time help to assist with the workload. These women are all effectively coordinated and supported by a project supervisor who oversees the activities in close collaboration with both Rehaswiss and CHASS. With the successful completion of multiple consignments and careful management of resources, the project continues to provide valuable opportunities for personal and professional growth of disabled women. The positive impact of this initiative highlights the potential for innovative projects to transform lives and promote inclusion within communities.

CHARITY GOAT FARM

The Charity Goat Farm Project is a holistic initiative aimed at empowering persons with disabilities (PWDs) by establishing mother goat units as a sustainable source of income and livelihood. The project integrates goat rearing, organic fodder cultivation, biogas production, and organic farming into a self-sufficient cycle. Goats provide milk, meat, and manure, while cultivated fodder ensures cost-effective feeding. Manure is processed in a biogas plant for renewable energy, and the nutrient- rich slurry is used as organic fertilizer, promoting sustainable agriculture. This eco-friendly model not only supports the economic well-being of PWDs but also encourages environmental sustainability.

ASSISI VIDYALAYAM POONTHOPE

Assisi Vidyalayam is a special school for individuals with intellectual disabilities established in the year 1992 by CHASS in the densely populated coastal town of Poonthope, Alappuzha. It aims at the holistic development of children with special needs, empowering them to live self-reliant and dignified lives while being happily integrated into their communities. A total of 80 students and 11 staff members are currently part of the institution. Following the SCERT syllabus, students are grouped into pre-primary, primary, secondary, pre-vocational, and vocational levels after assessment of IQ, physical abilities, and level of development. The curriculum emphasizes academics, behavioral development, and nurturing individual potential. Co-curricular activities such as yoga, music, dance, craft, and sports are included, along with therapy sessions tailored to student needs. The school, under the General Education Department, is subject to routine inspections by the Deputy Director of Education and Assistant Educational Officer, especially due to participation in the Midday Meal Program.



ACADEMIC YEAR INAUGURATING

The academic year began with the Sacred Heart prayer and blessing by Rev. Fr. Bibin Panjipuzha, Assistant Vicar of Poonthoope Church. After three years of dedicated service, Rev. Sr. Ancit Maria was transferred, and Sr. Treena Josephtook charge as the new Principal. The reopening ceremony, held on 3 June 2024, was inaugurated by Fr. Jince Choretu Chamakala, School Assistant Director, with felicitations offered by Rev. Fr. George Thycheril, CHASS Assistant Director.

DIGITAL LEARNING

In the reporting year, Assisi school inaugurated its exceptional learning programme for students, being the first special school in Kerala to enable digital learning. Recognizing that every child has unique learning needs, the school integrates technology with customized teaching methods to provide exceptional learning experiences that go beyond traditional classroom models. Through the use of interactive digital tools, specialized software, and assistive technologies, Assisi Vidyalayam empowers students to learn at their own pace while enhancing their cognitive, motor, and communication skills. The activities are set to commence in the upcoming academic year, with a focus on individualized support, digital learning tools, and holistic development for children with disabilities.



EXTRA - CURRICULAR ACHIEVEMENTS

Thirty students participated in the Deepika Children's League Colouring Competition and won both first and second prizes. The group song performance by our students received much appreciation at the National Disability Day event held in Paravoor. One of our students secured first prize in instrumental music (senior category) at both the Alappuzha District and the State School Kalolsavam in Kannur. At the Special School Olympics in Kozhikode, our students won first, second, and third places in shot put, relay, and long jump. The winners were honoured with cash awards and mementos.



SUSTAINABLE AGRICULTURE

Over the past four decades, Kerala's agriculture sector has experienced a prolonged period of crisis, deeply affecting the rural economy that depends heavily on farming. In response to this situation, CHASS has stepped in with a strong commitment to promote Sustainable Agriculture. Acknowledging the critical importance of agriculture in rural livelihoods, CHASS has developed and implemented a broad-based, multi-dimensional strategy to tackle the numerous challenges confronting farmers and the sector at large. The core elements of this intervention include:

Formation and networking of dynamic farmers' organizations

Establishment of Farmers Producers Companies

Adoption of a Whole Farm Approach

Promotion of Organic Farming methods


Support for value-added product processing and storage

Development of organized marketing systems

Through these initiatives, CHASS presents a holistic and sustainable solution to Kerala's agricultural crisis, aiming to empower farmers, enhance productivity, and uplift the economic status of rural communities.

PROMOTION OF ORGANIC FARMING

CHASS is actively advancing food and health security through a strong network of community-based organizations, including self-help groups, farmers' collectives, and joint liability groups. At the grassroots level, local social service units are leading a widespread campaign to promote organic farming and organic vegetable cultivation among households. This initiative highlights the use of value-added bio-manures and bio-pesticides as eco-friendly alternatives to chemical fertilizers and pesticides. Various units actively distributed grow bags, vegetable seeds, and saplings to families interested in starting or enhancing home gardens.



As part of its continued commitment to agricultural development, CHASS organized a series of informative seminars across its units during the reporting year, specifically designed to enhance the knowledge and capacity of local farmers by introducing them to modern and scientific farming techniques. A key focus was placed on educating participants about various government schemes and subsidies available for farmers, aiming to ensure that they are well-informed and able to access the support they are entitled to.



HARITHA SAMRUDHI

As part of the 2025 Jubilee Year celebrations, the Parel Unit inaugurated the 'Haritha samrudhi' initiative under which a variety of saplings are being promoted and marketed to foster environmental sustainability. The project aims at enhancing community participation in eco-friendly practices that will contribute to long-term ecological well-being

HARITHABHAM INITIATIVE

The Harithabham initiative was launched under the leadership of the CHASS Punnamada unit. This initiative focuses on cultivating nine varieties of vegetables in various households in Punnamada and making them available to everyone. Vegetable seeds and seedlings were distributed to different beneficiaries during the event. The initiative promotes sustainable agriculture and community well-being. By encouraging local vegetable cultivation, it not only enhances food security but also fosters a sense of community among participants. This project empowers individuals to take charge of their nutrition and food security and promotes environmentally friendly practices, making it a fantastic step towards a healthier and Greener future.



ONAM AGRI FEST



Onam is a major festival celebrated in Kerala, India, and it often involves vibrant market activities. During Onam, markets are bustling with people buying and selling a wide variety of items. On the occasion of this year's Onam, CHASS opened two Onam markets, one at the CHASS premises and another at CHASS premium outlet under

Krishi Bhavan in collaboration with local farmers' clubs and SHGs to support farmers. The event featured a wide range of locally-grown fruits, vegetables, and other produce, which were exhibited and marketed. This approach provides farmers with better income by connecting them directly with consumers, thus cutting out middlemen and ensuring fair prices for their produce. The Onam Agri-Fest was inaugurated by Fr. Joseph Vaniapurackal, the President of CHASS. Pongamthanam Farmer Producer Company organized a vibrant Onam Agri Fest from 12th to 14th September 2024. The fest served as a platform for farmers to showcase their organic and traditional crops, processed goods, and farm innovations to a wider audience, thereby boosting local market linkages.

As part of the Onam celebrations, several units organized various community initiatives, including organic markets, distribution of food kits and utensils, and Payasam' melas. These activities aimed to promote sustainable practices, support local artisans, and foster a sense of community during the festive season, while some of them channeled their profit to charity initiatives.

CHASS SWASRAYA VIPANI

To promote sustainable agriculture and empower local communities, CHASS organized a series of agricultural exhibitions across its various units during the reporting year. These exhibitions served as platforms for our SHG members to showcase and sell a diverse range of fresh organic produce, handmade goods, and natural products, all reflecting their hard work and dedication. A major highlight of these exhibitions was the sale of a wide variety of plant saplings aimed at promoting home gardening and encouraging community members to adopt greener lifestyles.

CHASS NURSERY

CHASS operates an agricultural nursery within its central office compound as a key component of its Agri-promotion efforts. During the 2024-25 reporting year, the nursery actively supported local food security and environmental sustainability by distributing coconut saplings, banana saplings, fruit trees, growbags, and vegetable seed sand saplings to 2833 families. This initiative not only promotes home-based cultivation and organic farming practices but also empowers families to contribute to sustainable agriculture and self-reliance within their communities.

Samrudha Agriculture Nursery Kurumbanadom, established 40 years ago, serves as a demonstration farm and plant nursery in support of CHASS's agricultural programmes. Located in Kurumbanadom, a rural agricultural village 12 kilometers from the CHASS headquarters, Samrudha is dedicated to promoting sustainable organic farming and safeguarding farmers' interests. The nursery is well-known for its demonstration plots featuring crops such as coconut, rubber, plantains, bananas, vegetables, roots and tubers, pepper, and ginger. During the reporting period, Samrudha extended its services to over 8,500 farmers through awareness creation, model farm development, and the supply of seeds, seedlings, grow bags, and other agricultural inputs.

LIVELIHOOD INITIATIVES

CHASS remains steadfast in its mission to empower individuals through sustainable livelihood opportunities. Recognizing the importance of economic independence, especially among marginalized communities, we have implemented a range of skill development programs and vocational trainings tailored to local needs. These initiatives aim to enhance employability, promote self-reliance, and foster entrepreneurship paving the way for long-term social and economic transformation. Through targeted training, capacity building, and ongoing support, CHASS continues to nurture pathways to dignified and sustainable livelihoods.

SANCHARI SKILL TRAINING

CHASS conducts a special skill-training program tailored specifically to members of our Self-Help Groups (SHGs). These trainings are designed to equip participants with practical, income-generating skills that can be applied within their local contexts, fostering self-reliance and economic independence. During the reporting year, a total of 306 people successfully completed the training, organized across 15 batches. The program offers a comprehensive curriculum covering a wide array of vocational and creative skills. The following training modules are available through the initiative:

- Ornament Making
- Flower Making

The skill-based training continues to be instrumental in enhancing the livelihood prospects of individuals, especially women, enabling many to initiate small-scale enterprises or contribute meaningfully to household income. 
NATURAL RESOURCE MANAGEMENT (NRM)

The thrust of CHASS towards sustainable development of watershed and livelihood has prevailed upon its best for the enhancement of natural resource base. In this respect, the Natural Resource Management Programme being propagated extensively by the government and voluntary organizations with science and technology inputs goes in full agreement with the thrust of the Society. The physical work carried out in terms of water shed development and management during the reporting period are mainly, well recharging systems, vermin compost tanks, bio-gas plants, rain water harvesting tanks, Argo forestry, herbal cultivation, etc.

PROMOTION OF SUSTAINABLE WASTE MANAGEMENT

With the aim of managing kitchen waste sustainably and producing non-toxic vegetables through the use of organic fertilizers, several units organized waste management seminars. These seminars focused on promoting sustainable farming practices and educating participants on effective waste-to-compost techniques.

Different types of composts and biogas plants were promoted, encouraging the adoption of household-level composting to support organic farming.



WATER CONSERVATION

The flood prone Kuttanadu being the major operational area of CHASS, water conservation measures are of greater importance to us. Every year the people of Kuttanadu go through the same misery. During the floods, the fresh water sources and wells are contaminated by the sanitation facilities of homes due to rise of water levels. Recognizing the plight of the people of Kuttanadu, CHASS widely promotes ferro cement rooftop tanks to harvest rainwater in a technologically appropriate, durable, and cost-effective way and thereby address longstanding drinking water challenges and supports the community. Additionally, by capturing and storing rainwater, it reduces surface runoff, preventing soil erosion and flooding.


Despite abundant rainfall, Kerala also experiences water scarcity in some regions during the dry season, highlighting the need for water conservation and storage. Climate change is leading to more erratic rainfall patterns and increased instances of extreme weather events, making rainwater harvesting even more crucial. Harvesting rainwater can reduce dependence on external water sources, promoting self-sufficiency and resilience.



DAY OBSERVATIONS

WORLD WATER DAY OBSERVATION

On 22 June, in honor of World Water Day, CHASS Eravuchira Unit conducted an educational seminar focused on water conservation and purification techniques. The session was led by Mr. Babu Mathew, who provided participants with practical guidance on sustainable water management. The event was formally inaugurated by CHASS Director Fr. George Panekezhham. In conjunction with the seminar, free water-quality testing was offered, enabling both unit members and local residents to assess the safety and purity of their drinking water.



AWARENESS CLASSES AND WORLD CANCER DAY OBSERVATION

CHASS organized a series of awareness classes and World Cancer Day observances across various units and at the regional level. These sessions aimed to educate the community on cancer prevention, early detection, and the importance of adopting healthy lifestyle practices. Conducted with the active participation of unit members, SHG member sand others, the programs served as powerful platforms to dispel myths, promote timely health check-ups, and encourage community engagement in the fight against cancer.

ENVIRONMENT DAY OBSERVATION

In observance of World Environment Day, CHASS organized a special awareness programme for school students to foster a sense of responsibility and care towards the environment. The session aimed at sensitizing young minds to the urgent need for environmental protection and sustainable living. To reinforce the message of ecological stewardship, CHASS distributed plant saplings to the participants, encouraging them to plant and nurture greenery in their surroundings. In addition, reusable cotton sanitary napkins were also distributed to promote sustainable menstrual hygiene practices, further under lining the connection between health, environment, and mindful living.



Environment Day observances were conducted across various units. These events featured activities such as sapling distribution, tree planting, and cleaning drives to promote environmental awareness and community participation.

FARMERS CLUBS

CHASS is also promoting farm clubs as part of promoting agriculture with special reference to organic farming. There are 61 farmers clubs actively engaged in farming practices in the operational area of CHASS. These groups focus and promote organic farming and they also organize village markets where people can buy chemical pesticides, fresh vegetables and other products at normal prices.

FARMERS PRODUCERS' COMPANIES

Under the banner of CHASS, two Farmer Producer Companies (FPCs) are actively functioning, comprising 45 Farmers' Interest Groups (FIGs) formed and supported with the assistance of NABARD and SFAC. These FPCs play a pivotal role in organizing small and marginal farmers into a structured collective, enabling them to benefit from economies of scale and shared resources. The companies support their members across various stages of the agricultural value chain. Special focus is given to the promotion and sale of value-added products, thereby enhancing the income and sustainability of farming households. By facilitating access to inputs, technology, credit, and markets, these FPCs serve as a powerful platform for empowering rural farmers and fostering agri-entrepreneurship. On 10 January 2025, CHASS Farmers Welfare Producers Company Pongamthanam, inaugurated a flourmill. Dr. N. Jayaraj, MLA, Chief Whip of Kerala, officially launched the facility. The company now proudly produces and markets a range of high-quality products, including rice flour, wheat flour, ragi powder, coffee powder, chilly powder, coriander powder, and turmeric powder. This initiative is a significant step toward supporting local farmers, and promoting self-sufficiency in agricultural produce.

WOMEN AND CHILDREN

Empowering women and nurturing children have remained key focus areas of our organization since its inception. Recognizing their vital role in building resilient communities, CHASS implemented a range of targeted programmes to promote awareness, skill development, health, and holistic well-being. From life skills training and educational support for children to awareness classes, vocational training, and self-help initiatives for women, our activities aimed to create safe, inclusive, and supportive spaces that foster growth, confidence, and self-reliance.

ARCHDIOCESEAN WOMEN'S ASSOCIATION FOR RURAL DEVELOPMENT

Archdiocesan women's association for Rural Development (AWARD) is the network of 73 Mahila samajams functioning under CHASS at rural villages. The Mahila samajams of village women are purported to play an effective complementary role in shaping up a vibrant and value-based village community in all respects. It is noteworthy to mention here that almost all these mahilasamajams have come forward as a strong force to join movements and struggles against social evils and for social justice at grassroots. At present, the women groups have come in a big way to take up enterprises and engage in definite occupations in order to prove their worth in the economic life of the community, also as an empowered force.

REGIONAL CONSULTATION MEETS



AWARD conducted 13 Regional level consultation meetings in order to study the status of gender related activities at CHASS units' and to work out an action plan for future interventions. The programme intends to generate the safest employment opportunities especially for rural women who struggle with financial bottlenecks. The services provided under Grahasree programme include, care after delivery, part time house maid, childrearing etc.

FR. GEORGE PANAKEZHAM MEMORIAL TRAINING CENTER FOR WOMEN EMPOWERMENT



CHASS started a new venture for the uplift of women in our target area named Fr. George Panakezham Memorial Training Centre at Koothrapally, Kottayam. The center was officially inaugurated and blessed by Fr. Joseph Vaniyapurackal, president CHASS on 17th August 2024, as a key step towards promoting women's empowerment and skill development. Currently, the center offers a range of

training programs to equip women with practical skills and confidence. This initiative aims to enhance their economic independence and social inclusion, especially among the marginalized sections of society.



OTHER DEVELOPMENT TRAINING INITIATIVES

CAREER AND JOB EXPO

As part of its mission to enhance youth employability and promote skill development, CHASS has been actively facilitating internship and placement opportunities in collaboration with reputed institutions and government schemes. This initiative reflects CHASS's continued commitment to empowering youth through meaningful job placement opportunities in partnership with reputed institutions. CHASS, in collaboration with SBI Life, organised a recruitment interview on 26 April 2024 at CHASS Conference Hall. Altogether 83 candidates participated in the interview of which 17 individuals were selected for employment. Under the Prime Minister's Internship Scheme, CHASS, in collaboration with MRF Tyers, Kottayam, facilitated internship opportunities with stipends for male candidates aged between 21 and 24 years. An interview for the same was conducted on February 26, 2024, at the CHASS Conference Hall, in which 68 candidates participated. Out of them, 47 candidates successfully cleared the interview and commenced their internship on March 4, 2024.



LEGAL COMPLIANCE SEMINAR

To raise awareness about the legal documentation and statutory requirements essential for the proper functioning of social service organizations, CHASS organized a Legal Compliance Workshop on 27 May 2024. The workshop was inaugurated by His Grace Mar Joseph Perumthottam, and the sessions were led by Fr. Anil Crasta, Director of ORBIT. Forty-seven administrative representatives from registered NGOs and other institutions participated in the program. The workshop served as a valuable platform for enhancing legal literacy and ensuring compliance in the administration of social service initiatives.

DRUG ABUSE PREVENTION & DE-ADDICTION

As a committed agent of social transformation, CHASS has prioritized the fight against substance abuse as a core area of its mission. Recognized as the State Level Coordinating Agency (SLCA) under the Ministry of Social Justice and Empowerment, Government of India, CHASS has implemented a range of impactful intervention stop prevent and reduce drug addiction. Through collaboration with Caritas India, the Government of Kerala, Archdiocesan networks, and several other partners CHASS has advanced holistic strategies encompassing awareness building, early intervention, psycho-social support, treatment linkages, and sustained community-based rehabilitation, empowering individuals and families to break free from the cycle of addiction and reclaim their lives.

SAJEEVAM

CHASS, in collaboration with Caritas India, has taken a proactive, multifaceted approach to address the growing menace of drug abuse. Through strong partnerships with Archdiocesan structures and other key stakeholders, CHASS implemented comprehensive initiatives including awareness campaigns, psycho-social support, treatment facilitation, and sustained handholding support for vulnerable groups. These collective efforts aim to reduce drug dependency and build a healthier, more resilient community.

Every month we conduct awareness sessions targeted on different vulnerable groups and different aspects of prevention and use of substances.



SLCA-KERALA

RRTC (Regional Resource Training Centre) South Zone II renamed as State Level Coordinating Agency (SLCA) Kerala, is entrusted to Changanacherry Social Service Society (CHASS). It is the designated agency of the Ministry of Social Justice and Empowerment (MSJE), Government of India for the coordination of all NAPDDR programs, Drug crimes intervention and building drug free society for the effective functioning of De-Addiction-Drug Abuse Prevention Programs in the State of Kerala. It also ensures the upgradation of the professional skill of the functionaries of IRCAs in Kerala with proper training and networking.

PATHWAYS TO RECOVERY DE-ADDICTION

Substance abuse in Kerala is a rising public health and social problem, with high rates of alcohol and increasing drug use, especially among youth. To address this problem, CHASS in collaboration with Diocese of Salzburg, initiated an yearlong project in 2024 December which combines.

- Mass awareness campaigns to educate youth, parents, and community members
- Recreational facilities to encourage healthy alternatives
- Psycho social support services including workshop sand family-based support
- Formation of Alcoholics Anonymous (AA) groups for peer-based recovery support
- Skill training for affected families to help them achieve financial stability

The ultimate goal of the project is to reduce substance abuse through education, support, healthy engagement, and empowerment, building a safer, healthier Kerala.



INTEGRATED REHABILITATION CENTRES FOR ADDICTS (IRCA)

CHASS proudly operates two de-addiction centres in Alappuzha district under the Ministry of Social Justice and Empowerment, offering vital support to individuals battling substance abuse. These centres provide comprehensive care including medical treatment and psychological counseling, helping individuals reclaim their lives with dignity and hope. Through dedicated staff and a compassionate, holistic approach, the centres have become a beacon of recovery and transformation for many in the community.

ACCEPT IRCA KATTANAM

The Integrated Rehabilitation Centre for Addicts (IRCA), Kattanam, a flagship initiative of the Changanacherry Social Service Society (CHASS), has been rendering its dedicated services since 1st April 2000. With the capacity to accommodate up to 18 residents at a time, the Centre provides comprehensive treatment programmes ranging from 33 to 90 days, tailored to the condition of each individual. Anchored in the mission of restoring hope, healing, and wholeness, IRCA envisions a society where every seeker of recovery finds it, free from the shadows of stigma, and renewed as a nobler human being. The Centre upholds the highest regard for human dignity, treating each person as unique, while remaining steadfast to the principles of the Twelve Step fellowship and receptive to innovation in the field of care. Its holistic interventions encompass pharmacological management, individual and family counselling, group therapy, re-educative initiatives, AA meetings, home visits, supportive- person sessions, and outreach programmes, all harmoniously directed towards the transformation of lives and the reclamation of human potential.



AWARENESS PROGRAMS

Awareness is created to prevent alcoholism and drug abuse by holding seminars, study classes, public meetings, audio-visual classes and other awareness programs. Counselling services are also provided to the Juvenile Justice Centres run by Ministry of Social Welfare, Govt. of Kerala.



ACCEPT IRCA PUNNAPRA

ACCEPT IRCA Punnapra was established at Punnapra in Alappuzha District by the Changanacherry Social Service Society (CHASS), a pioneer in the sector of social services with an unblemished record. On 22 February 1992 we started ACCEPT IRCA De-addiction Centre Punnapra at Alappuzha and it is continuing its functioning with the grant, in aid for De-addiction Treatment from the Ministry of Social Justice and Empowerment, Govt. of India. Guided by the mission to eliminate stigma and discrimination, ACCEPT IRCA envisions offering the finest treatment in a safe and friendly environment, recognizing addiction as a disease and abstinence as its best management. With a holistic approach focusing on mind, body, and spirit, ACCEPT IRCA provides modern treatment methods including psychotherapy, personality development classes, and comprehensive care. The Centre's key functions include pharmacological management, individual, family, and group counselling, behavioural therapy, Al-Anon and Al-Ateen meetings, vocational and educational support, workplace assistance, home visits, outreach programmes, and supportive person meetings-making it a leader in addiction recovery and rehabilitation.

CORPORATE TAILORING CENTRE (COPTAC)

COPTAC holds the distinction of being the oldest undertaking of CHASS, having been established in the year 1975. Located in the immediate vicinity of the CHASS's administrative office, the centre performs dual functions viz., training of girls in tailoring and embroidery under government KGTE scheme and undertaking garment making. On an average 100 girls complete training every year with certificates. The production wing absorbs 50 women. The production unit has a tie up with the Khadi and Village Industries program that the cloth produced under it is tailored into readymade garments at COPTAC. A special feature of the tailoring job carried out is that vestments and cassock are done here on a large scale with reputation.



TOGETHER TOWARDS DIAMOND JUBILEE

Changanacherry Social Service Society has successfully completed 59 years of blissful service to the poor and the needy irrespective of caste, creed or religion. From the humble beginnings in the year 1966, CHASS has now grown into a reputed social work organ in the state of Kerala particularly in South and Central Travancore. While journeying with the people for the last 6 decades, CHASS has been instrumental in identifying and implementing many innovative and development projects/ programs for the overall development of the target community. More than 70,000 families are directly partnering with CHASS through its network of Civil Society Organizations and they powerfully witness the huge mass base of CHASS. The basic approach of CHASS is facilitating capacity enhancement of partner families through an inclusive and participatory manner. The projects and programs of CHASS are, by and large, directed towards 'Sustainable Development' both in content as well as integration.

JUBILEE DECLARATION / CELEBRATION

The sixth of February 2025 was a historic day for the Changanacherry Social Service Society, celebrating three remarkable milestones. This year marks the beginning of the Diamond Jubilee year of the Changanacherry Social Service Society, honouring 60 years of dedicated service and transformative growth; the Golden Jubilee of COPTAC, our tailoring centre, which has empowered women for the past 50 years through skill development and independence; and the Ruby Jubilee of Khadi Gramodyog Vidyalaya, commemorating 40 years of empowering rural communities through training and employment. These milestones highlight our commitment to social welfare and the positive impact we have made over the years.



HARITHA SAMRUDHI JUBILEE PROGRAM

CHASS designed a massive program in order to commemorate its Diamond jubilee named-Haritha Samrudhi targeted to promote and ensure land security, food security, health security and economic security to 60000 selected families from 150 local parish- based villages in Kottayam, Alappuzha, Pathanamthitta, Kollam and Trivandrum districts of Kerala state coming under the jurisdiction of the Archdiocese of Changanacherry. Land security provides the stable access to land necessary for agriculture, directly supporting food security by ensuring availability, accessibility, utilization, and stability of food supplies. Health security involves creating the environmental and socio-economic conditions for good health and preventing illness. Economic security ensures that people have access to resources, income, and livelihoods to meet their basic needs, including food and healthcare. These forms of security are interconnected, as land degradation impacts food production, while lack of economic resources can prevent people from affording nutritious food or accessing healthcare, and environmental factors can affect health.

INAUGURATION OF RENOVATED COPTAC BUILDING

In commemoration of the Diamond Jubilee of CHASS and Ruby Jubilee of COPTAC the existing COPTAC Tailoring Centre building was renovated and extended for upgrading the function of the unit. The upgraded facility offers improved infrastructure and learning spaces, enabling us to train more individuals, especially women, in tailoring and skill development.



KHADI & VILLAGE INDUSTRIES

CHASS started Khadi& VI Programme in 1977 with the financial assistance of Kerala Khadi & VI Board. In 1983, Khadi& VI Commission, Govt. of India included CHASS in their direct list and expanded the Khadi & VI Programme on a -Three Tier System namely Training, Production and Marketing. The main focus of CHASS through KVI Programme is to provide employment to rural people irrespective of Caste & Creed in Villages, creating self-reliance and building up of a strong rural community with the support of Khadi & VI Commission and Kerala Khadi & VI Board.

TRAINING PROGRAMME

We started Khadi Gramodyog Vidyalaya Mallappally in the year 1986. We conducted 20 training programmes during the reporting year at KGV Mallappally and its various extension centres.
